AYENI FACULTY NOTES

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1944 PRE-REGISTRATION PROCEDURE FOR WINTER QUARTER 1944
(December 13-17)

1. Student will present Activity Card to the Registrar.
2. Student will fill out three schedule cards and have Registrar indicate classification and major.
3. Student will report to Faculty Adviser to get:
 1. Winter Quarter Schedule
 2. Course Cards
 3. Schedule Blank
4. Student will copy complete schedule on three schedule cards and fill out one course card for each course.
5. Student will get approval of faculty adviser on all cards and file same with Bursar (the student is not officially enrolled in classes until all fees have been paid to the Bursar).
6. Student will pay bills and get official receipt from Bursar.
7. Classes begin per schedule, January 5, 1944.

N. B.: Official REGISTRATION days are December 22 and January 4.

FALL QUARTER GRADES

1. Teachers will file Quarter sheets and Class Record Books in Registrar's Office by December 23 at 4 p. m. They will not record grades on small cards in Registrar's Office.

2. Passing grades are A, B, C, D. E is a conditional grade which may be changed later (within one calendar year) by the instructor. I is a grade for uncomplete work. It, too, may be changed by the instructor within one calendar year. F is failure and not subject to change by the instructor.

3. Maximum number of days for Fall Quarter is 36. Subtract absences from 36 (48 if 4 hour course; 12 if 1 hour course).
