A. in Chicago, October 26-28 by its president, Dr. W. S. Davis and its dean, Dr. George W. Gore Jr. The conference considered "Planning and Participation of the Negro Land-Grant College in the Post-War Program." Dr. Davis served on the Committee on Findings and led the general discussion after the opening session on Tuesday morning. Dr. Gore also attended the twenty-eighth annual session of the Association for the Study of Negro Life and History and the Michigan Education Association held in Detroit, October 29-31.
