The Fall 1943 registration figures include students from 51 Tennessee counties, 20 other states and 1 foreign country. There are 598 women and 80 men -- a total of 678.

There are 3 graduate students, 95 seniors, 89 juniors, 162 sophomores, 327 freshmen and 2 special students.
