MR. WALTER C. ROBINSON of Chattanooga, Tennessee and father of the Robinson twins, students at A. & I., received praise from an article written in the NYPS Magazine by Miss Mary W. Sherman, Chicago, Illinois, for his efforts and success in getting Tennessee Negroes to the poll in order to vote and exercise their rights as citizens.

A. & I. graduates are quite active in government projects. MR. ALFRED C. GALLOWAY is director of the J. C. Napier Homes in Nashville, Tennessee; MR. WILLIAM G. ANDERSON is head of the Langston Homes in Washington, D. C.; and MISS MAE HAWES is associated with the Lucy D. Slowe Homes in Washington, D. C.

The NATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF COLLEGE WOMEN, of which MRS. JEANETTA WELCH-BROWN, A. & I. graduate, has been recently made national secretary, is rendering a service that is of interest to all minority groups. They have asked officials to continue the Fair Employment Practice Committee; this organization is cooperating with the American Association of University Women on consumer problems and on the plan for a Consumer Clearing House.

MR. A. PHILLIP RANDOLPH, International President of the Brotherhood of Sleeping Car Porters, was presented by the Nashville Branch of the N. A. A. C. P. at the St. John A. M. E. Church, Sunday, April 25, 1943. The subject of Mr. Randolph's address was "The Negro and The War."

DR. WILLIAM R. ODELL has recently been appointed to the position as superintendent of the schools of the city of Oakland, California. Dr. Odell has been a leader in the field of Business Education. He was formerly in charge of the business teacher-training program at Teachers College, Columbia University, New York, having established this department.
