

## Frist Chair First For TSU

Tennessee State University has received a \$600,000 gift from the Patricia C. and Thomas F. Frist, Jr. Foundation. The gift will be used to fund the FRIST CHAIR OF EXCELLENCE in TSU's College of Business.

According to state guidelines, the gift will be matched dollar for dollar in the state of Tennessee Chair of Excellence program. "This gift demonstrates the commitment of Dr. & Mrs. Frist to higher education, in general, and to Tennessee State University, in particular," Dr. Hefner said.

"This gift makes it possible for Tennessee State University to fulfill the dream of educating outstanding scholars in the field of business," he added.

"The Chair was established in the College of Business because it is poised on the threshold of becoming an outstanding school and could give an immediate payoff to our community and state," Dr. Frist stated. "The recent tragic events in Los Angeles have made the gift even more timely and meaningful," he added.

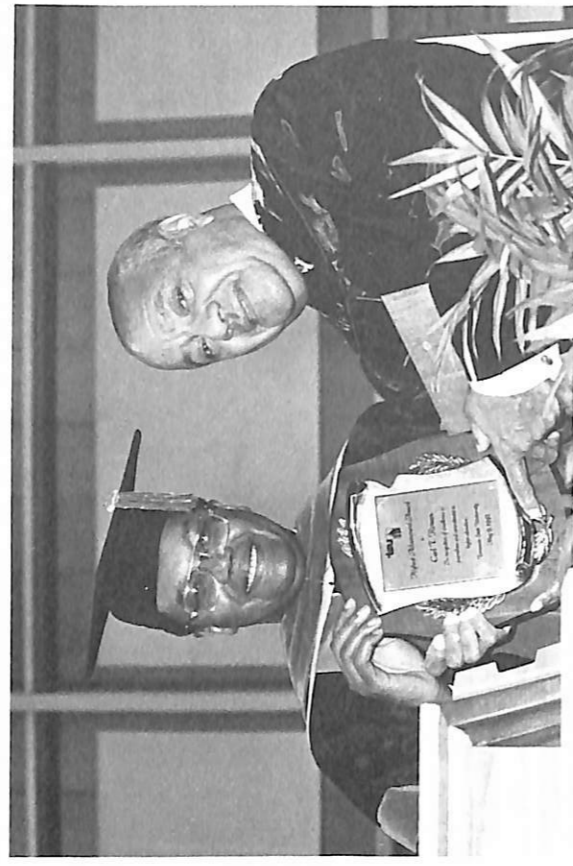
The College of Business is seeking accreditation by the American Assem-

bly of Collegiate Schools and Businesses. "The Chair will definitely put us in a good position to receive accreditation," according to Dr. Tilden Curry, Dean of the College of Business. Only 26% of colleges nationwide have this distinction.

TSU will receive the private money over two years. Dr. Curry said he expects to name a scholar in the chair for the 94-95 academic year.

The Tennessee Chair of Excellence program was established by the state in the mid 80's. It was set up so that private funds raised for a chair are matched by the state. Income available from established chairs is used to bring in other distinguished scholars. "To me, TSU has been for many years an asset in this community that has not been developed to its full potential," Dr. Frist remarked. "I thought it was time for the private sector to join the public in a partnership to take the university to a new level," he continued.

Dr. Frist is chairman of the Board of Hospital Corporation of America, headquartered in Nashville.

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## Profile: Frank Battle

Since 1978 there has been progressive improvement in the quality of service rendered by the purchasing and business service department. During this period Frank Battle Jr., the current Director of Purchasing and Business Services, has played an intricate role in the development of this area at Tennessee State University.

Battle holds a BS degree from Southern University in Baton Rouge, LA, and a MBA and MPA from Fairleigh Dickinson University in Rutherford, N.J. Those who know and trust his work describe him as a "stickler" for details. His insistence on exactness has aided in propelling the department to its current level of productivity.

In addition to his extensive training in business and management, he is also a graduate of Northwest Institute of Medical Technology in Minneapolis, MN. Before coming to TSU, Battle worked as a medical research assistant at Vanderbilt University.

Earlier, Battle retired from the US Army after a successful and much decorated career with the rank of Lieutenant Colonel. Colonel Battle also had job assignments with the US Air Force. He served stateside at Fort Benning, Georgia; Fort Eustis, Virginia; Fort Gordon, Georgia; Fort Meade, Maryland; McGuire AFB, New Jersey; and Dover AFB, Delaware. His overseas tours included service in Germany, Japan, Korea, and Vietnam.

He was awarded the Bronze Star, Kosovo Service Medal, United Nations Service Medal, Vietnam Service Medal, Meritorious Service Medal, Army Commendation Medal with three Oak Leaf Clusters, and others.

Battle is quick to admit that his military career and other work experiences have been rewarding and educational, but his tenure at TSU has been filled with accomplishments. He began serving the University as a technical buyer in the purchasing department. He was promoted to the position of Assistant Director of Business Services and in 1983 was named Director of Purchasing and Business Services. Although the work has been challenging, Battle has noted a number of positive changes at the university. One administrative change that has brought significant improvement to the management of services offered by

the University was the merging of three key areas. "Auxiliary Services, Purchasing and Printing and Duplicating were all placed under one director," Battle said. "This has improved our level of efficiency and productivity tremendously."

According to Battle, other notable changes appear to be on the horizon. "In the near future we hope to computerize our total operation," Battle added. "Vice President Harkleroad is committed to giving us the necessary resources to do a quality job."

Away from the campus Battle is active in church and several civic organizations. He is a longtime member of Gordon United Methodist Church. In addition, as a member of The Tau Lambda Chapter of Alpha Phi Alpha, Inc., he serves on the fraternity's Education Foundation and is Sergeant-At-Arms.

To relax and escape the daily grind of figures and contracts, Battle turns to one of his numerous stress reducing hobbies. "I like to relax by gardening or roller skating," he said. "If that doesn't work, I read current events or watch sports."

Battle is married to the former Ethel B. Hines of Alexandria, Louisiana. Mrs. Battle is a graduate of Dillard University and Vanderbilt University Graduate School of Nursing. She is a Clinical Specialist in Psychiatric Nursing at the Alvin C. York VA Medical Center.

## Master Plan Update

### New Campus Center at Tennessee State University is Scheduled for Completion in Summer of 1992

"When will TSU's new Campus Center be completed?" That is probably one of the most asked questions, both on and around the campus of Tennessee State University.

Construction of the new Campus Center is part of the \$112 million capital improvement project, at TSU. Combined with the newly renovated Kean Hall, the extensive construction project stretches from John A. Merritt Boulevard and 33rd Avenue North, to 35th Avenue North.

The Director of Capital Projects for the State of Tennessee, Carl Manka, said, "The present schedule calls for the completion of construction of the Campus Center by mid-summer."

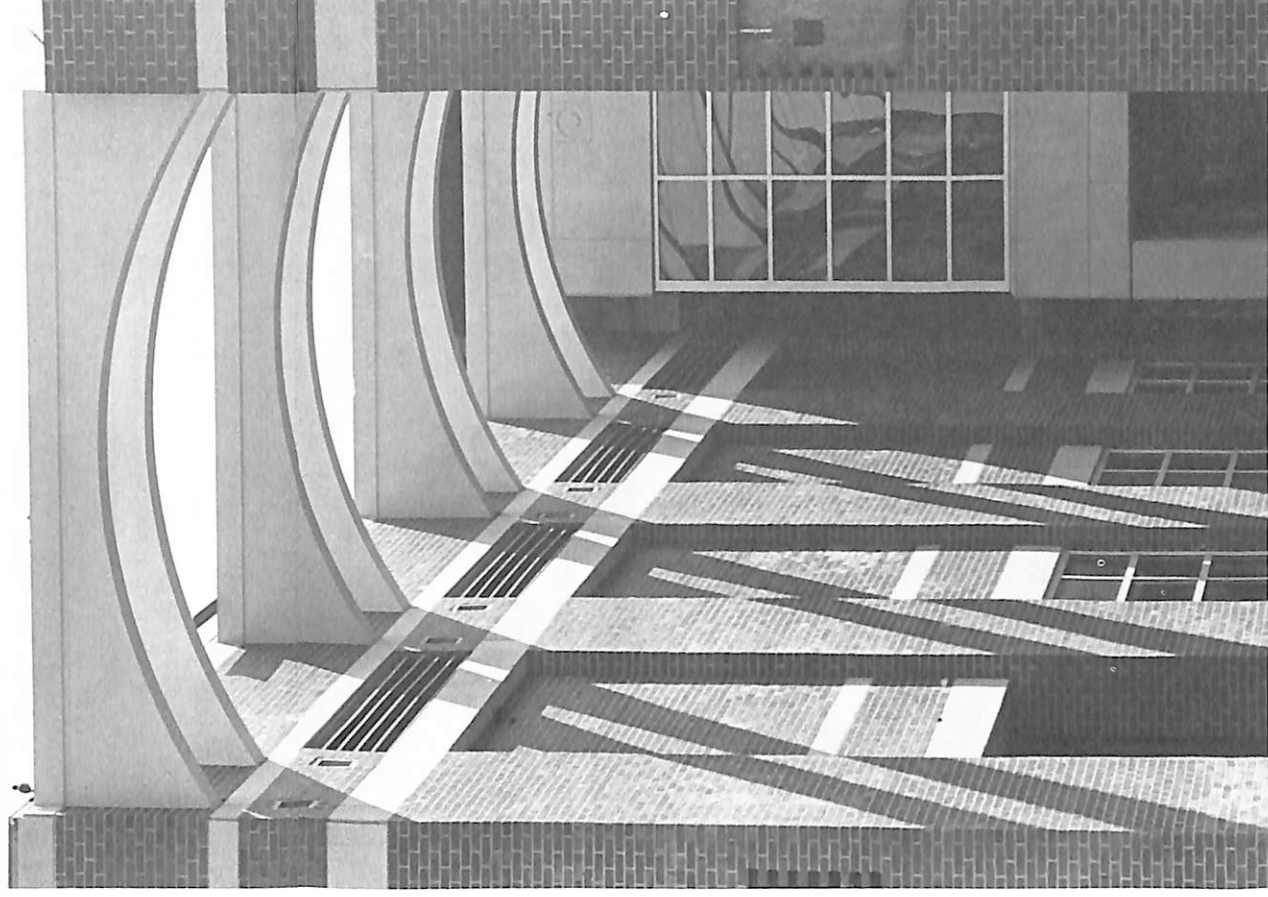
"The Campus Center should be operational by the start of the Fall semester," he added.

The Center will be three stories in height and includes a 70-foot tower with a reflector that glows in the dark. The reflector will be visible from downtown Nashville.

Other amenities include a dining facility for students, faculty, and staff, offices for Student Affairs, Financial Aid, Admissions and Records, a 15,000 square foot bookstore, a 350-seat auditorium and suites for student organizations.

Attached to the Center will be the newly-renovated Kean Hall, which will house basketball and racquetball courts, a bowling alley, game rooms, exercise facilities, and offices.

All phases of the \$112 million capital improvement project are expected to be completed by the mid-90's.

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# News Briefs . . .

- Tennessee State University has received a \$1.3 million grant for Neural Research in the College of Engineering and Technology. The Office of Naval Research (ONR), the research arm of the U.S. Navy, issued the grant award. The grant award period continues through April 30, 1995. Neural engineering research involves the study of the nerves and how they react to various stimuli. The award will also provide for pre- and post-graduate training of students in a nationally and internationally recognized basic and applied research and development environment, focusing on critical present and future technologies.

- Lieutenant Colonel Arthur Laird received his Certificate of Retirement from the Armed Forces of the United States of America from Colonel Ronald W. Beshant, after 22 years of honorable and faithful service in the U.S. Air Force. His last assignment was as Detachment Commander of the Air Force Reserve Office Training Corps at Tennessee State University.

- Dr. Ralph Simpson, Chairman of the Department of Music, has received a \$100,000 grant award from the National Endowment for the Arts. The award represents the first grant ever received by the University's Department of Music from the Endowment. The grant will make possible a consortium comprised of TSU and four (4) other historically black institutions, whose purpose will be enhancement of K-12 music education in cities where the participating institutions are located.

- Dr. Stephen Shao, Jr. is Director of the University's new Office of Economic and Business Research. Dr. Shao is charged with collecting and disseminating business and economic research primarily on minority and small businesses. Additionally, he will be involved in long-range planning to include possible collaboration with other universities in an effort to serve our community in a unified way, research the role of emerging information technology, and joint activities with the Chamber of Commerce.

- The Chapter of the Student Tennessee Education Association was awarded a \$500 Community Learning grant from the National Education Association through America's Schools Assistance Program. Students serve as volunteers on the Homework Hotline, assisting other students with questions pertaining to their homework assignments. The 1991-92 president of the local STEA chapter is Linda Reese. Gloria M. Lewis, director of the Center for Minority Teacher Education Affairs and assistant professor of psychology, serves as advisor to STEA.

- The Libraries/Media Centers are acting as a resource center for six historically black colleges and universities participating in the Computer Resource Access in Tennessee or CREATE Network. The Network is currently in its first year of funding from the Fund for the Improvement of Post-Secondary Education, U.S. Department of Education. CREATE serves HBCUs by establishing and enhancing the use of computer-based infor-

mation retrieval services in these institutions. Additionally, CREATE helps close a large information technology gap between these institutions and other higher education institutions. Fletcher F. Moon, project director of the CREATE Network, recently held an information workshop for library directors and program participants. Dr. Lorene B. Brown, associate professor, School of Library and Information Studies, Clark-Atlanta University was the keynote speaker.

- The Physical Therapist Education Program has received initial accreditation for its entry-level baccalaureate degree physical therapist education program. Graduates of the University's baccalaureate degree physical therapy education program are now eligible for membership in the American Physical Therapy Association.

- Dr. Mayibuye Mandela, professor, TSU Journalism Program; Kevin Pollard, staff writer for the *Tennessean*; and Momo Rogers, professor, MTSU Journalism Department, have received a grant from the Dow Jones Newspaper Fund. The joint TSU-MTSU Summer Journalism Workshop will run July 5-25, 1992. The Workshop is designed to introduce high school students to journalism and encourage them to pursue studies in the field. Students of African, Asian, and Native-American descent and others from cultural groups that are underrepresented in the nation's newsrooms, are the focus of the Workshop.

- Dr. Joan C. Elliott, professor, German, Department of Language, Literature, and Philosophy gave a lively presentation on "Ethnicity and Diversity in the Curriculum" to the faculty and students of the foreign language programs at Michigan State in conjunction with their Enhance Your Future Conference. Dr. Elliott shared insights and suggestions regarding plans to introduce diversity issues into a more traditional curricula. She was also among presenters at the Southern Conference on Afro-American Studies Inc., National Convention at Virginia State University. Dr. Elliott presented her paper, "DeFord Bailey, A Country Music Pioneer." She argued that country music's roots reach into a blending of black melody and white yodeling.

- Tennessee State University students participated in the prestigious student research day conference at the "Sixth Annual Undergraduate Research Conference" in Minneapolis, Minnesota. The nine students were selected from a pool of more than 900 students from colleges and universities across the country. The Undergraduate Research Conference is considered one of the most prestigious undergraduate research conferences in the United States. Students' presentations ranged from research-related issues relative to interpersonal communication to mediocrity-crisis in education.

- Dr. Geardean Johnson, associate professor and acting department head in the Department of Home Economics recently served as a visiting professor at the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA), Family Economics Re-

search Group in Washington, DC. Dr. Johnson worked on a project related to the quality of well-being of the rural elderly.

- Dr. Decatur Rogers, Dean of the College of Engineering and Technology, has announced a \$50,000 grant from the General Electric Foundation to renew the Engineering Concepts Institute (ECI). E.C.I. is a six-week, summer program for high school graduates who plan to major in Engineering at TSU. The funding provides for 60 students to participate in the program. Dr. Rogers announced several additional grants for the E.C.I. to include: ALCOA Foundation, \$6,000; AT&T Bell Laboratories, \$10,000; Bellcore, \$10,000; General Motors Corporation, \$10,000; R. J. Reynolds, \$5,000; and Union Pacific Railroad, \$5,500.

- The TSU student leaders have been elected for the 1992-93 Academic Year. The Officers for the Student Government Association are: President, Leclia Rives; Vice President, Terrence Sampson; and Miss TSU, Dale Williams.

- The TSU Association of Office Personnel (TSUAOP) observed National Secretaries' Week. Tennessee Board of Regents Chancellor, Dr. Otis Floyd, keyed the annual Salad Luncheon. TSUAOP officers elected for the 1992-93 year are, President, Lois Gathright; Vice President, Darlene Harris; Corresponding Secretary, Eleanor Dartis; Recording Secretary, Renae Golden-Bell; Treasurer, Perianne Day; Historian, Chris Black; Parliamentarian, Colista Lanier; and Chaplain, Pattie Hardimon.

- TSU will host a conference on "Cultural Diversity: Appreciation of Self & Others," July 29-31, 1992. The conference is designed to empower participants in developing pro-active approaches which address potentially confrontational situations often present in multicultural environments. Conference presenters include, Marino Alvarez, Ph.D., TSU; Fannie Cathey, Ph.D.,

TSU; Edith Costanza, M.Ed., National Coalition Building Institute; Jill Graham, M.Ed., TSU; Eleanor Graves, M.Ed., National Coalition Building Institute; Sam Proctor, D.Th., Professor Emeritus, Rutgers University; and Cathy Robinson, B.A., TSU. The Conference will be held at the Holiday Inn Crowne Plaza, Union and 7th Avenue. For more information contact Jill Graham at 251-1523.

- The Tennessee State University Upward Bound Program has begun its summer academic enrichment program for high school students who are interested in pursuing a college degree. The Program will be in operation through Friday, July 24, 1992.

- Terry L. Edwards, a graduate student pursuing a Doctorate in Psychology is the recipient of the prestigious William Ballard Award. The Clarksville resident received the award during the Spring Convention of the Tennessee Association of School Psychologists (TASP).

The award is presented each year by TASP in conjunction with Tennessee State University to a Tennessee graduate student in the field of school psychology. The recipient is chosen at the University level as one who has demonstrated outstanding performance in his or her graduate studies.

- Dr. Roderic N. Burton, Department of Social Work and Sociology, hosted a state elder abuse conference. The theme of the conference was "Elder Abuse: Kind Persistence = Working With Resistant Clients." More than 120 social workers, caregivers, health care professionals, and adult protective service workers who provide services to the elderly attended. # Stull Receives Call

Junior pitcher Everett Stull II, a native of Stone Mountain, Georgia was selected in the third round by the Montreal Expos in the annual Major League Baseball draft.

The 6-3, 189 pound right-hander was 4-8 with a 3.70 earned run in 1992 with the Tigers of Tennessee State. In 75.1 innings he recorded 92 strikeouts, while allowing 47 hits and 60 walks.

"I'm extremely happy," said Stull. "Everyone wants to go in the first or second round, but the third round is better than the fourth."

Stull, whose fastball has been clocked in the low 90s, also has 5 complete games and 1 shutout this past season for the 14-27 TSU squad.

Scouts from virtually every major league club followed Stull's progress throughout the spring.

"He did a good job of handling the pressure," said Allen Robinson, head baseball coach.

Robinson said Stull's "poise and confidence" convinced the scouts he deserved an opportunity.

Stull has not yet made a decision on whether to forego his last season of eligibility.

# TSU Cagers Schedule Set

Two tournaments and non-conference games against Louisiana State University, Wake Forest University and David Lipscomb University highlight the 1992-93 Tennessee State University men's basketball schedule.

"It's a very competitive schedule," said head coach Frankie Allen. "We are playing some quality programs."

TSU will compete in Southwest Missouri State's annual Pizza Hut Classic on December 4-5. The University of Idaho and University of Arkansas-Little Rock are also slated to appear in the tourney.

Tennessee State will also participate in the George Washington University tournament on December 11-12 in Washington, D.C. Columbia and St. Francis (NY) will be the other two squads.

"We're playing in a couple of good tournaments," added Allen. "I'm glad we are playing in the tournaments early because they should help us prepare our new players for the conference portion of our schedule."

TSU will have road games against St. Louis University (December 21), LSU (December 30) and Wake Forest (January 4) in addition to Ohio Valley Conference away games.

"LSU and Wake Forest were both in the NCAA tournament this past season," stated Allen. "These two games will be a real challenge for us. They will be real strong tests to see how well the new kids have adjusted."

The Tigers, with ten signees and four returning lettermen, should be an improved squad over last year's 4-24 team.
