ESTIMATED INCOME AND VICTORY TAX

Don't forget to file a Declaration of Estimated Income and Victory Tax Form for 1944 by April 15. Individuals with wages subject to withholding above \$2,700 for a single person, or \$3,500 for married persons living together, must file declarations. Quarterly payments of estimated tax are required of persons who are not substantially paid up on their taxes by withholding from wages.

## GROUNDS FOR FLIGHT

The true university approach to aviation goes a long way beyond motors and wings. Just how far it goes was suggested last week as the University of Illinois got ready to turn the sod on what will be the No. 1 university-owned airfield in the U. S. The 800-acre, \$2,500,000 Champaign County field will be the center of many kinds of research. Possibilities:

- Agriculture: development of nonskid grass for landing fields.
- Dentistry: prevention of loss of fillings at high altitudes.
- Medicine: study of the effect of temperature and diet on flyers.
- Pharmacy: how to fly rare drugs and serums without deterioration.
- Civil engineering: development of best possible paving for runways.
- Topography: problems of airfield site selection, drainage, grading, obstacles.
- Business management: handling of cargoes.
- Economics: effect of airfields on neighboring property values.
- Law: zoning against noise nuisance; traffic rules.
- Humanities: languages and customs of areas on world flying routes.
