FACULTY COMMITTEES

In the first group come the committees responsible for the following matters: the curriculum, catalogue, schedule of classes, calendar, and teaching methods; admissions, entrance examinations, relations with high schools, registration, transfers, and advanced standing; individual work, scholarships, honors, and prizes; requirements for degrees; and the library. The three commonest and most important are the curriculum, admission, and library committees.

In the second group come the even more numerous committees that deal with some phase of student welfare. The following matters are all included although there is not always a separate committee for each: student affairs, student housing, student publications, student health, student discipline, supervision of student clubs and organizations, student religious life, athletics, debating, fraternities and sororities, student employment, student loans, and auditing of student accounts. In almost every college one finds at least four of the above committees -- those concerned with student affairs, athletics, publications, and student aid.

In the third group come the committees on college publications, public lectures, convocation or chapel, commencement, alumni, community relations, and educational conferences. These matters concern the welfare and development of the college as a whole and its service to and relations with people off the campus.

The fourth group of committees is concerned with teaching personnel. Usually there are four topics to be considered -- the appointment of new teachers, the promotion of teachers, leaves of absence, and faculty research.

Finally there is a small group of committees having administrative or advisory functions. The faculty's own executive committee, for putting through routine business and keeping the red tape in order, and the budget committee -- if there is one -- are both administrative. The advisory committee and the committee on committees are extremely important groups. In addition to the above groups there is sometimes a committee on rules and another on educational policy. In both cases, the work is primarily advisory.
