GRADUATE EXAM
TO BE ADMINISTERED

The Graduate Record Examination, Aptitude & Advanced Tests will be administered Saturday, January 21, 1978 in the Physics & Mathematics Auditorium.

All currently enrolled graduate students who have not taken the Graduate Record Examination and all previously enrolled graduate students who have not passed the Graduate Record Examination and who plan to return to the University should register to write this examination during the current enrollment period.

To register for this examination the student

should bring or send a complete "GRE Enrollment Blank" and "Graduate Record Examination - Application" along with evidence of payment of appropriate fees to University Testing Center Room 207-Education Building, Tennessee State University, Nashville, Tennessee 37203, no later than January 13, 1978.

The fees for the Aptitude and Advanced Tests are \$13.00 each. Therefore, the cost for both tests is \$26.00

Fees may be paid directly to the University Business Office, or may be paid at the Testing Center Office by Check or money order. No cash will be accepted in the Testing Center Office.

The relationship between communications and education is the subject of a recent study by a TSU faculty member. Dr. Jerry McGee, associate professor of education, is co-author of the article, which is to be published in February or March by the Association for Supervision and Curriculum Development.

"The chapter looks at the impact of communication on education now and in the future," McGee said. "We looked at various forms of communications including print, spoken, video and non-verbal communication. We studied the cost of textbooks and looked at the impact of CB radios and newspapers.

"Our conclusion is that communication is not likely to enslave in an Orwellian type future. It will influence and impact on educa-

tion, just as education will have an influence on communication.

Publications are not new to McGee, who was dean of continuing education and director of the summer sessions at Middle Tennessee State University, before coming to TSU this year. He has published about 43 articles.

The article, "What Elementary Principals and Teachers Say About Supervision in Tennessee," has been accepted for publication in "The Educational Catalyst."

McGee was born in Florence, Alabama.

He has taught in Alabama and South America before joining the MTSU staff in 1971. McGee is a member of numerous organizations. He is married and has two children.

SEASON OPENS

TSU's basketball team opens its season this week. The Tigers play Eastern Illinois here Saturday, November 26 at 7:30 p.m. Georgetown University will be in town Monday, November 28, to take on the Tigers.

Coach Ed Martin isn't used to start building from a losing season. Yet that's what he's doing this year.

Martin, whose teams have gone to six NCAA Tournaments in his nine years with the Big Blue, is trying to rebound from a 9-16 season last year.

Starters are expected to be Bernard Bailey, 6'7", 225 pound senior All-American from Holly Hills, S.C.; Nomti Davis, 6'7", 215 pound sophomore of Warren, Ohio; Saunders "Foo" Bolfield, 6' sophomore; Ricky Cole and Basil "Pat" Smotherman, 6'5" 190 pound senior from Nashville's Pearl.

Top newcomers include James Blake, 6'5", 190 pound freshman, who was most valuable player in South Carolina last year, along with Jonathon Green, 6'7", 200 pound cager from New Orleans, Justin Taylor, 6'8", and James Kearse, 6'8", 215 pounds from Raleigh, N.C.

The schedule is just as tough, maybe tougher than last year. Waiting are two meetings with perennial power Kentucky State along with UT-Chattanooga, Kentucky Wesleyan, Eastern Illinois, North Alabama, Northern Kentucky and Belmont College.
