Jackson State University Profile

In 1877, Jackson State opened its doors in Natchez, Miss., operating as Natchez Seminary, a private school under the auspices of the American Baptist Home Mission Society of New York. Its purpose was to educate the newly freed between Memphis, Tenn., and the Gulf Coast of Mississippi.

Serving primarily as an educational institution to train ministers and teachers, the school enrolled 20 students and occupied the Old Marine Hospital. In order to be more centrally located, the school was moved to Jackson in 1882. It became state supported in 1940, gained university status in 1974 and was designated the Urban University of Mississippi in 1979.

After more than a century, Jackson State University has evolved from a mission of training teachers and preachers to a comprehensive urban university in the state's capital and largest city. While it remains proud of its heritage as one of America's leading Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs), it has become an increasingly diverse institution offering a myriad of opportunities for personal growth and achievement. The approximate 6.500 students enrolled at Jackson State come from every Mississippi county. many states and numerous foreign countries.

Jackson State is the fourth largest institution of higher learning in Mississippi and the only public, four-year institution in the central Mississippi area. Degrees are offered on the bachelor's through doctoral levels, and the university is ranked 11th among the nation's HBCUs and traditionally white institutions in granting baccalaureate degrees to

African Americans.

The faculty numbers nearly 400 talented educators of diverse backgrounds. These teaching and research professionals are drawn to State Jackson from prestigious institutions around the world. Seventy percent hold a doctorate or terminal degree in their fields. As the Urban University of Mississippi, Jackson State emphasizes public service programs designed to enhance quality of life and seek solutions to urban problems in the physical, social, intellectual and economic environments. Conferences. workshops. technical assistance, training programs and other degree and non-degree offerings allow

the university to extend its human, cultural and physical resources into the city.

The university provides young men and women opportunities to develop knowledge and skills that will empower them to succeed in an increasingly complex world. Under the leadership of its eighth president, Dr. James E. Lyons, Sr., Jackson State University moves confidently toward the future as a major force in the region and among its peer institutions. Since assuming the presidency in July 1992, Dr. Lyons has completed a Campus Master Plan that projects the growth of the university well into the 21st century. developed additional graduate and undergraduate programs, and secured land and other property for growth and revitalization of the area around the campus.

A \$13.5 million expansion which approximately doubled the size of



the H.T. Sampson Library, a \$2 million restoration of historic Ayer Hall and a \$1.6 million renovation of B.F. Roberts Hall are complete. Construction is underway on a new \$17.2 million home for the School of Liberal Arts, the first of several new buildings envisioned in the Campus Master Plan. Additional renovation projects include the Administration Tower and Just Hall of Science.



Jackson State University President

Dr. James E. Lyons

Dr. James Earl Lyons, Sr., assumed the presidency of Jackson State University on July 1, 1992. He brought to Jackson State a proven track record of rallying businessmen, city and county officials, and community leaders behind the goal of a university.

Since arriving at Jackson State. Lyons has been able to attract support from all segments of the community and collectively, they have recognized the need for developing Jackson State University as the Urban University of Missisippi and revitalizing the West Jackson community.

One of the most important steps in that direction has been Lyons' development of a Campus Master Plan that projects the growth of the university well into the 21st century. A \$13.5 million expansion of the H.T. Sampson Library, a \$2 million restoration of historic Ayer Hall and a \$1.6 million renovation of B.F. Roberts Hall are complete. A \$17.2 million home for the School of Liberal Arts, the first of several new buildings envisioned in the Campus Master Plan, is currently underway. Other renovation projects include the Administration Tower and Jus Hall of Science.

Lyons has waged an aggressive campaign to increase academic offerings at the university. Under his leadership, 15 new graduate and undergraduate programs have been approved or implemented. These include: the bachelor's in child care and family education, educational technology, foreign languages and health care administration; the master of science in communicative disorders, hazardous materials management, systems management. and master of arts in teaching and urban and regional planning: and business doctorates

administration, chemistry, clinical psychology, public administration, urban and regional planning, and social

work. These academic achievements are bolstered by the establishment of the School of Social Work: expansion of the Master's in Public Policy and Administration (MPPA) program to departmental status. making it the only such department in Mississippi's higher education system; and the Fall 1998 opening of the School of Allied Health Sciences.

Included among his most impressive achievements is the accreditation of the Jackson State University School of Business by the American Assembly of Collegiate Schools of Business. Only 25 percent of schools nationwide hold this distinction.

Additional accomplishments include the university being ranked 11th among the nation's Historically Black Colleges and Universities and traditionally white institutions in granting baccalaureate degrees to African Americans; being named a contender in the National Science Foundation's Minority Institution of Excellence (MIE) program; earning the distinction of the sole HBCU with a Reading Recovery Program, an intervention program for "at risk" first-grade students; and having a fully operational campus television station.

Achievements are also occurring outside the confines of the campus. Support of a proposed parkway, an extensive boulevard which will link Jackson State to the downtown business district and greatly improve West Jackson, has been received from city, county, state and federal officials. Additionally, the acquisition of land and other property and the demolition of vacant and dilapidated housing near



the campus will greatly enhance efforts to develop and revitalize the West Jackson community.

Prior to assuming the presidency of Jackson State University, Lyons served as president of Bowie (Md.) State University for nine years (1983-1992). A native of New Haven, Conn., he holds degrees from the University of Connecticut (B.A., Spanish, 1965; M.A., Student Personnel, 1971; Ph.D., Professional Higher Education, 1973) and has done post-doctoral study at the Harvard University Institute for Educational Management A widely published author. Lyons has written articles on subjects ranging from the United States Constitution to integration and race relations. His works have appeared in such publications as the Educational Record, the Howard Law Review, The Journal of Negro Education, Today's Education, Essence Magazine and World View (a publication of the American Association of State Colleges and Universities' Office of International Programs).

He serves on various boards and commissions, including the United States Air Force Board of Advisors for Historically Black Colleges and Universities and Minority Institutions. Lyons has made numerous appearances before school, community and professional groups, and before Congress a number of times as a spokesman for such groups as the American Council on Education, American Association of State Colleges and Universities, and National Association for Equal Opportunity in Higher Education. He has served as the lead person in AASCU's Delegation of Presidents to Mexico and has judged The Clarion-Ledger's All-Star Seniors competition.

Jackson State Athletic Director

Paul Covington

Paul Covington was named director of athletics at Jackson State in June of 1996. He had served as acting director of athletics since July 1995 and was assistant athletics director from 1986-95. Covington is a former JSU head basketball coach.

Covington brings a wealth of experience and athletic knowledge to the job. A standout guard for the Tigers in the 1950s, Covington was also a very successful coach on the high school, junior college and college levels before moving to the administrative side of athletics.

As assistant athletic director, Covington worked primarily with compliance, and he was highly regarded for his knowledge and interpretation of NCAA and conference rules.

Covington gained fame as the Tigers' head basketball coach from

1967-86. During that span, his teams won six Southwestern Athletic Conference titles as he

compiled a 338-195 career record. He won back-to-back league crowns in 1973-74 and 1974-75. His other conference championships came in 1968, 1970, and he tied for the SWAC title in 1982. His 1974-75 team was ranked number one in the nation by most of the Division II national polls. That team finished with a 25-4 record.

After graduating from Jackson State in 1956, Covington spent two years in the Army. He took his first coaching job at Higgins High in Clarksdale, Miss., in 1958, winning three conference titles in four years.

His next stop was at Coahoma Junior College in Clarksdale. He promptly guided Coahoma to the state junior college championship. From 1964-67, Covington served as an assistant basketball coach at JSU under

his former college coach, Harrison Wilson. The Tigers went 88-27 during that span.


A native of Lexington, Ky., Covington was named All-Midwestern Athletic Conference twice during his playing days at JSU. He is a member of the Tigers' sports hall of fame.

An avid golfer, Covington spends his relaxing hours on the golf course. He is an excellent golfer.

Covington earned his bachelor's degree from Jackson State and his master's degree from the University of Kentucky.

Covington is married to his former high school sweetheart, Marion, and they have three children, Sheryl, Paul Jr., and Vivian.







Jackson State **Season Outlook**

Despite loss of major talent, JSU is roaring with crop of hungry new players

After losing 22 seniors, including 15 starters, from last season's 9-3, Division I-AA Playoff team, it appears the Jackson State University Tigers should be emerced in a major rebuilding project for the 1998 football year. A closer look at the major losses reveals they are not ordinary losses.

Head coach James Carson and his staff must find replacements for six seniors who signed NFL contracts, a record-setting all-America quarterback, the starting place kicker, the two leading tacklers on defense and the top two receivers from last year's team.

Last April, JSU continued its legacy of sending Tigers to the NFL when offensive tackle Toby Myles and wide receiver Corey Bradford were each drafted in the fifth round. Cornerbacks Quincy Coleman and Bo Lewis, running back Carlos Knight and receiver Daryle Heidelburg also hooked up with NFL teams.

For the first time in three years. the Tigers will kick off the season without all-America quarterback Grailyn Pratt. During his career, Pratt threw for a school record 6.893 yards and 57 touchdowns. Despite his loss, this position is strongly represented with junior Mark Washington, who completed 57.4% of his passes as Pratt's backup last year. He is considered one of the most talented quarterbacks in college football. Washington's backup this year is expected to be redshirt freshman T.C. Taylor, another big quarterback with loads of talent and potential.

Destry Wright is the top returning

running back in the SWAC.
Last season he led the team in rushing with 878 yards and eight touchdowns.
Sophomore Damion Duckworth returns, and sophomore Harold Rhodes is back after missing last year.
Transfers Brian Darden from Tennessee and William Spencer from Syracuse figure into the mix.



Morris is the top returnee with 49 receptions last year for 739 yards and four TDs.

The coaching staff's biggest concern on offense is the lack of experienced depth on the line. While Tony Blackshear, Devin Rutherford, Frank Wynn, Jeremogi Todd, Thomas Holloway and Phillip Turner are all veterans with experience, depth is thin. Jamal Butler and transfer Jason Entzminger are expected to beef up the line.

Defensively, the major areas of concern are in the secondary and at linebacker. Safety Eric Wilcher is the only returning starter in the secondary. Vincent Burton and

Taquiza Johnson are the front runners for the cornerback positions. Rashard Anderson will likely be the starting free safety.

Marcus Beeks, Harold Wooten and Dennis Thompson are the only returning linebackers with experience.

The strength of the defense will be the line where veterans Jason Marshall, Eric Chandler and Edward Hawes return. Tony Rogers, Don Pelichet and Brad Collier add depth.

Senior Kenny Paige, who averaged 33.7 yards per punt, returns. Sophomore Brian Reynolds will handle extra point and field goal duties.

Jackson State Head Coact

James Carson

James Carson finished his sixth season as Jackson State's head football coach with a 9-3 overall record, a 7-1 Southwestern Athletic Conference showing and a third consecutive trip to the Division I-AA playoffs.

Carson's career record stands at 47-21-1. His best season was in 1996 when his team posted a 10-2 record. The 10 wins marked only the second time in history the Tigers have won 10 games during the regular season. JSU won 10 regular-season games in 1978 and finished the 1962 season with 10 total wins, following an Orange Blossom Classic post-season victory over Florida A&M.

Of the 15 SWAC titles Jackson State has won, coach Carson has been a part of 12, either as a player or as a coach. JSU has won two league titles with Carson as head coach.

Posting nine wins and going to the playoffs were two of the highlights of the 1997 season for Carson's Tigers. Having six players off the team sign NFL contracts was certainly an outstanding achievement.

In 1996, Carson's Tigers won a SWAC title, made a second consecutive trip to the playoffs and set several team and individual records.

The Tigers dominated the league finishing first in almost every statistical category. JSU led the conference in total offense, scoring offense, passing offense, rushing offense, kickoff returns, total defense, scoring defense and rushing defense.

Carson received coach of the year honors from the Pigskin Club of Washington, D.C. in 1995 and 1996 and the 100% Wrong Club in Atlanta, Ga., in 1995. Carson was named SWAC coach of the year after the 1995

In 1995, Carson's Tigers set a team record by winning their last eight consecutive regular-season games. They also tied the record (set in 1978) for most interceptions in a season with 27. The team's overall record was 9-3.

Carson, who has served as the Tigers' defensive coordinator since 1977, was named head coach in 1992. He became the eighth Tiger head coach since 1946.


In his first season as head coach, Carson guided the team to a remarkable 7-4 record even though he didn't have the opportunity to guide the team through spring drills.

During his second year as head coach, the team slipped to 5-5-1 while posting several superlatives. Running back Williams Arnold set an NCAA national record by rushing for 346 yards in JSU's 38-12 win over Texas Southern. The team set an NCAA national attendance record by averaging 34,100 fans per game.

In 1994, the Tigers surprised everyone by finishing the year with a 7-4 record despite being picked in most polls to finish below .500 and in the bottom half of the SWAC race.

JSU gained national prominence as a defensive power during Carson's stint as defensive coordinator. In 1977, the Tiger defense was first in the nation in total defense and rushing defense, and second in interceptions.

The 57-year-old served as assistant head coach at Jackson State from 1990-92. His assistant



coaching experience includes stints at South Carolina State College (1968-77), Alabama A&M University (1965-68) and Rust College (1963-65). During the 1975 and 1976 seasons with Carson as the defensive leader. South Carolina State compiled an 18-4 record while yielding only 68 points (an incredible two point-pergame average) and the team registered 11 shutout victories.

A native of Clarksdale, Miss., Carson is a 1963 graduate of Jackson State. He lettered four years as an offensive guard and nose guard for the Tigers receiving honorable mention NAIA all-America in 1962. After posting a 10-1 record that year. the Tiger were named the Pittsburgh Courier national champions. During Carson's career as a player, the Tigers posted a 30-12 record. He played on the Tigers' first two SWAC championship teams (1961 and 1962). and he played in two Orange Blossom Classics in Miami, Fla.

Carson and wife Zelma have one son, Ricardo, who played linebacker for JSU from 1991-94.

Success Begins with Commitment

Jackson State Coaching



David **Geralds** Linebackers

David Geralds joined the Tiger coaching staff in 1994 as the linebacker coach after serving as head football coach, track coach and athletic director at Southern University Lab School in Baton Rouge, La. (1992-93). When he graduated from Southern University in Baton Rouge in 1978, he went on to play two years with the Houston Oilers before moving to the Detroit Lions in 1980. After serving on the Baton Rouge police department for four years, Geralds returned to athletics as linebacker coach and defensive line coach at Winston-Salem (N.C.) State University from 1988-92.

Robert Hughes Asst. Head Coach/Running Backs

Robert Hughes joined the Tiger coaching staff during the 1979 season after a four-year absence. He was a defensive line coach from 1971-72 and linebacker coach from 1973-74, before taking a job with the Mississippi Department of Corrections. A graduate of JSU, Hughes has four years of experience with professional football clubs, including stints with the Houston Oilers and Atlanta Falcons. In addition to coaching the running backs, he serves as equipment manager, and he also provides academic counseling. His son, Robert Jr., is a former member of the football team.



Robert Kelly Defensive Coordinator

Robert Kelly was promoted to defensive coordinator in July of 1996. He played quarterback and safety for JSU from 1967-72, and joined the staff in August of 1987. The Gulfport, Miss., native was formerly defensive coordinator of McComb (Miss.) High, where he worked for 14 years. Kelly coaches the defensive backs at JSU. During the 1994 season, he was named the recruiting coordinator. A highly regarded quarterback out of high school, Kelly led Jackson State to a 20-14 win over Grambling in JSU's first game at Mississippi Memorial Stadium in 1967.

Ben McGee Defensive Line

Ben McGee returned to coach at Jackson State after a 21-year absence. McGee was named defensive line coach in July of 1996. McGee previously coached the Tigers' defensive line from 1073-75. After Jackson State, he served as an assistant coach at Mississippi Valley, the University of Arkansas Pine Bluff (twice) and Texas Southern. He was also a high school head coach at Calloway High and Jim Hill High in Jackson. McGee graduated from JSU in 1964 after being named NAIA All-America. He played nine years with the Pittsburgh Steelers, and was named team MVP in 1966





Carl Roberts Offensive Line

Carl Roberts joined the staff in 1987 after serving as a volunteer assistant during the 1986 season. Roberts was an outstanding guard for the Tigers from 1979-82. He was named to the All-SWAC team three times. In 1983, Roberts was a graduate assistant for the Tigers. In 1984 and 1985, he played professionally with the Oklahoma Outlaws and San Antonio Gunslingers of the USFL. At B.L. Moore High School in Crawford, Miss., Roberts lettered four years as an offensive and defensive tackle and also threw the shot-put on the track team, an area in which he earned all-state honors.

John **Shannon** Offensive Coordinator


John Shannon joined the Tiger coaching staff in 1994 after serving two years as the receivers coach at the University of Maryland. In addition to serving as the offensive coordinator, Shanon coaches the quarterbacks and receivers. During his two years at Maryland, the Terrapins set 52 offensive school records and 16 ACC offensive marks. Lewis **Lidell** Band Director

The 200-member Jackson State University "The Sonic Boom of the South" Marching Band, backed by a percussion section dubbed War 'n' Thunder and led by high-stepping Prancing J-Settes, is directed by Dr. Lewis Liddell. Associate band director is Edward Duplessis. Assistant band directors are Paul Adams, Michael Magruder and William Bethea.

"The Sonic Boom of the South" is in demand for appearances which have included a World's Fair; halftime appearances for the Atlanta Falcons, Detroit Lions, New Orleans Saints and Cincinnati Bengals; a television

special for Motown's 30th anniversary; and the NBA All-Star Weekend. The band is a favored entry in halftime performances

during football season as well as for parades across Mississippi and in other states.


"The Sonic Boom of the South" is one of the best known college or university marching bands in the country.

Appropriately dubbed a show band, the group was given its name by band students in 1971. In 1974, the band's theme, "Get Ready," an old Motown favorite, was selected and

three years after that, the "Tiger Run-On" was perfected. The "Tiger Run-On" is a fast, eye-catching shuffle that blends an

adagio step with an up-tempo shuffle, then back to adagio – a "Sonic Boom" trademark that brings fans to their feet during halftime performances.

The band was first organized in the 1940s and consisted of college students from Lanier High School in Jackson. Through the years, it has become known for intricate, precision marching and Big Band sound.





TSU's "Aristocrat of Bands"

CLASSIC-MERTAGE

Edward L. **Graves**Band Director

In the fall of 1946, after six weeks of practice, a 100-piece marching band took to the field at Tennessee State University, and a tradition of excellence was born.

The idea for a show band at Tennessee State University originated with its second president, the late Dr. Walter S. Davis. President Davis selected J.D. Chavis to serve as the first band director. Under Chavis' leadership, the marching band grew and developed into a premier university band that gave spectacular performances in parades and half-time shows at football games. In 1947 and 1948, the marching band performed in the Washington Classic in Washington, D.C. where top historically black colleges and universities competed for national championships.

Chavis' tenure as band director ended in 1951 and the baton was passed to Frank T. Greer, Tennessee State University's distinctive style was further developed under Greer. The band continued to earn invitations to special events.

Four years after Greer began his work, the TSU band was invited to perform during the half-times show of a Chicago Bears-Los Angeles Rams professional football game. The performance was the first of a series of nationally televised half-time shows for the band. It was also the first time a historically black university band had appeared on national television.

Between 1956 and 1978, the TSU band performed half-time shows for nine professional football games. Reportedly, it was during one of these half-time performances that a sportscaster claled the marching band from Tennessee State University, "The Aristocrat of Bands."

Needless to say, the name stuck.

The Aristocrat of Bands has also appeared in the Orange Blossom Classic in Miami, The Blues Bowl in Memphis an the Grantland Rice Bowl in Wichita Falls, Texas.

In 1961, the TSU band claimed another first for historically black universities when it was invited to march in President John F. Kennedy's inaugural parade. One of the students who marched in that parade was

Edward L. Graves, who is the present director of the Aristocrat of Bands.

Since 1979, Graves has continued to build the legacy. The Aristocrat of Bands has shared its characteristic precision and distinctly soulful style with people throughout the country and in foreign lands.

"Greer taught us to dream and to really work hard," Graves recalled. "He taught us no to be satisfied with just anything. You don't put a man on the moon without a lot of work. He instilled those standards in us. He taught us to excell."

Students who achieve membership in the Aristocrat of Bands adhere to those standards today. Noted as one of the finest and most spectacular university bands in the United States, the Aristocrats are the featured attraction during pregame and half-time performances at all home games and most out-of-town competitions.

Still in demand for half-time performances, parades and other special events, the band's recent




special appearances include a spot in the 1981 CBS television movie "The Concrete Cowboy," a 1982 ad for WSMV, Nashville's NBC affiliate, a 1984 performance at the Mirage Bowl Football game in Tokyo, Japan, and a performance at Disney World.

In January of 1993, the Aristocrat of Bands participated in the 52nd inaugural presidential parade for President Bill Clinton, marching in the streets of Washington, D. C.

This year the tradition will continue. Audiences will be thoroughly entertained by the band's unique marching style and musical versatility. A group of various majorettes enhance the dynamic style and sound of the Aristocrat of Bands.

Graves is assisted by Kevin Davenport, associate band director, Tommy L. Davis and James Sexton, assistant band directors and Judy Gentry, majorette coordinator.






Tennessee State University Profile

Through successive stages, Tennessee State University has developed from its founding in 1912 as Tennessee State Agricultural and Industrial State Normal School for Negroes. The University began serving students on June 19, 1912. In 1922, the Institution was raised to the status of a teacher's college and empowered to grant the bachelor's degree. The first degrees were awarded in June of 1924. during the same year, the institution became known as the Agricultural and Industrial State Normal College, and in 1927 "normal" was dropped from the name.

The General Assembly of 1941 authorized the State Board of Education to upgrade substantially the educational program of the college, which included the establishment of graduate studies leading to the master's degree. The first master's degree was awarded by the college in June of 1944. In August of 1951, the institution was granted university status. The University was elevated to a full-fledged land-grant university in 1958. In 1979, Tennessee State University merged with the



University of Tennessee at Nashville. The present-day TSU is a comprehensive, urban, land-grant university which offers 42 bachelor's degrees, 21 master's degrees, and a specialist in education. Doctoral degrees are offered in four areas: public administration. administration and supervision, curriculum and instruction, and psychology. Enrollment for the 1994 fall semester reached 8,180 students — the only increase in enrollment at a four-year institution in the Tennessee Board of Regents system. TSU is accredited by the Commission

on Colleges of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools.

TSU's main campus, located in North Nashville, occupies more than 500 acres. The Avon Williams campus of TSU is located in downtown Nashville, near the State Capitol and center business district. TSU is completing a \$112 million capital improvements project, through which seven new facilities have been or will be constructed and all existing structures renovated.

Tennessee State University President

Dr. James A. **Hefner**

Dr. James A. Hefner became the sixth president of Tennessee State University in Nashville, Tennessee on April 1, 1991. He has served in a variety of executive and administrative level positions at several colleges and universities. He has also held professorships at very distinguished institutions across the nation.

President Hefner came to Tennessee State University from Jackson State University in Mississippi where he served as president from 1984 to 1991. Prior to his appointment at Jackson State, he served two years as provost at Tuskegee Institute, now Tuskegee University, in Alabama. He also served as professor of economics and chairman of the department of business and economics administration at Morehouse College in Georgia. While at Morehouse. Dr. Hefner was the first professor selected to hold the Charles E. Merrill Chair, an endowment of one-half million dollars provided by Merrill Lynch.

Earlier in his career, Dr. Hefner taught economics at Atlanta University and Clark College in Atlanta, Georgia and at Florida A&M University in Tallahassee. In addition, he has been a visiting research associate at Harvard and Princeton Universities, and at the

University of Wisconsin in Madison.

President Hefner, a native of Brevard, North Carolina, is a graduate of North Carolina A&T University in Greensboro. Postgraduate degrees were earned from Atlanta University (Master's degree in economics) and the University of Colorado, Boulder (PhD. degree in Economics)

A renowned authority on minority economic issues, Dr. Hefner serves as an economic and business consultant to many organizations in the public and private sectors. He is the author of more than fifty articles on economic research, and has authored or co-edited two books entitled Black Employment in Atlanta and Public Policy for the Black Community: Strategies and Perspectives.

Dr Hefner has pursued a distinguished career in public service and recognition of his achievements has led to appointments as consultant to the Congressional Black Caucus, The National Institute of Public Management, the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, representative on the prestigious Southern Regional Education Board, member and chairman of the Board of Directors of the New Orleans Branch of the Federal Reserve Bank

of Atlanta, Board of Directors of the American Council on Education, and

Board of Directors of St. Dominic Memorial Hospital in Jackson, Mississippi.

Since becoming president of Tennessee State University, Dr. Hefner has been appointed to serve on Third National Bank's External Council for the Community Economic Development Program, Success by Six Steering Committee, Alliance for Environmental Education Board of Directors, United Way Board of Trustees, St. Thomas Hospital Board of Councilors. National Board of Advisors for the Center of Excellence Council, Council on Families in America and Leadership Nashville. He has also served as vice-chair for government relations for the Nashville Area Chamber of Commerce.

Dr. Hefner's scholarship has brought him numerous honors and awards. Included among these honors are his election to Phi Beta Kappa and Phi Kappa Phi, membership in MENSA, the NAFEO Achievement Award in Research, and listings in Who's Who in America and Who's Who in Black America.

President Hefner is married to the former Edwina Long and they have three sons: Christopher, Jonathan and David.

Tennessee State Athletic Director

Dr. Vivian L. Fuller

Dr. Vivian L. Fuller was introduced as the new director of athletics at Tennessee State University on October 1, 1997. Dr. Fuller comes to TSU after spending the last five years as the director of intercollegiate athletics at Northeastern Illinois University in Chicago. In addition to her position at Northeastern Illinois, she has served on numerous committees and advisory boards.

"Dr. Fuller brings to us remarkable organizational ability, excellent marketing skills, and a broad base of experience," stated Dr. James Hefner, Tennessee State University's president. "Dr. Fuller's credentials are impeccable, and she is widely respected in her profession. She has served on numerous NCAA committees, including the management council which aids in the governance of the entire organization."

Dr. Fuller is a nationally known speaker on the topics of women in sports, academic support programs for student-athletes, academic advising, women in management positions, gender equity, and the

importance of networking in the profession. She began her career in higher education at Bennett College in 1978 as the director of intramurals and instructor of physical education. From 1984-87 she served as assisstant director for advisement programs for student athletes at North Carolina A&M University. earning a promotion to assistant director of athletics. In 1987. Dr. Fuller became associate director of intercollegiate athletics at Indiana University of Pennsylvania, where she was responsible for internal operations of the program and developing the academic component for student athletes.

Fuller's accomplishments have been recognized by a number of organizations, including American Alliance of Health, Physical Education, Recreation and Dance (AAHPERD), Boy Scouts of America, and the Chicago Youth Success Foundation. Her achievements have been chronicled in national and local publications, including Black Issues in Higher Education, Jet Magazine, the NCAA News, and the Chronicle of Higher Education. She has published

numerous articles and given presentations on the national and regional levels on a variety of topics related to athletics administration. In the spring of 1996, the baseball team of Northeastern Illinois won the Mid-Continent Conference Championship and the NCAA Play-In series to advance to the NCAA West Regionals at Stanford University.

Fuller earned her Bachelor of Science Degree in Physical Education from Fayetteville State University in 1977, a Master's of Education from the University of Idaho in 1978, and a Doctorate in Higher Education Administration from Iowa State University in 1985. Her main two goals in athletics administration have been and continue to be development of a competitive broad base program for intercollegiate athletics without compromising integrity, academics and the welfare of student-athletes, and to create an avenue for other women an minorities aspiring toward careers in athletics administration.

Tennessee State **Season Outloc**

Late-season surge in 1997 has confidence soaring for an OVC title in '98

With one of the nation's most prolific passing attacks and veteran performers on both sides of the ball, the Tennessee State University Tigers are poised to make their bid for the Ohio Valley Conference title in

After back-to-back 4-7 campaigns, head coach L.C. Cole goes into his third season at TSU with a team on the prowl. The Tigers struggled early last year, but rallied late in the season to win three of their final four games.

And considering the fact that the team improved its OVC ledger from 3-5 to 4-3, and lost three games by a touchdown or less, one can understand why Cole and his squad are anxious to get started.

Offensively, TSU returns seven starters including the entire backfield, plus OVC co-offensive player of the year Tyrone Butterfield. A transfer from Michigan, Butterfield dazzled the OVC last year with 59 catches for 1.053 yards. Butterfield also led the league in kickoff return average (24.76) and in all-purpose running (1,703-154.82).

Butterfield, once again will team with quarterback Leon Murray, who like his favorite target, is a member of the preseason All-OVC team. The junior transfer from Pitt is the league's top returning passer with a rating of 130.2 He completed 144-of-272 passes last season (.529) for 2,207 yards and 16 touchdowns. He also finished third in the OVC in total offense (194.6 yards/game) and threw for over 300 yards on three occasions.

Joining Butterfield as a pass

catching threat junior Corey Sullivan. He caught passes for 488 last vards season, and led the team with a 20.3 yards per catch average.

The running game should be much improved

with one of the league's top returning backs in senior Calvin Davenport. Davenport carried 151 times for 793 yards and eight touchdowns a year ago. He averaged 5.3 yards per carry and just over 72 yards per game. Senior Arcentae Broome will be the team's startin fullback.

Up front, the Tigers have an All-OVC selection Shawn Carter still managed to record eight sacks. Thompson at guard and honorable mention Bennie Anderson at tackle. Thompson has started 26 of his 33 career games. TSU is relatively experienced on the line, with the exception of right tackle, where redshirt freshman Lawrence Smith and sophomore Jason McAllister will get most of the playing time. Junior Ike Boone anchors the line at center.

While the Tigers struggled defensively in 1997, they do return seven starters. The linebacking corps is loaded. Brent Sterling is back after leading the team with 86 stops in 1997. Armand Williams, a preseason All-OVC selection, was

second with 76 tackles. And standout Lamar Carter, returns after missing the last five games with an injury. Carter still managed to record eight sacks.

Senior safties Jarrick Hillery and Darrell Hinton return in the secondary. Juniors Anton Hector and Ligarious Jennings will see much playing time on the corners.

Sophomore punter Ashley Johnson is a preseason All-OVC choice and kicker Buck Billings was 23-for-25 on extra points and drilled two field goals of more than 40 yards. But freshman Gabe DeLong will get a serious look to handle the kicking duties.

Tennessee State **Head Coach**

_.C. **Cole**

Lawrence "L.C." Cole enters his third season as head coach of the Tennessee State University football tradition. He was introduced as the new head coach in January of 1996 at a news conference on the campus of TSU.

Cole is no stranger to the coaching profession, compiling 17 seasons of experience on both sides of the ball. Prior to his arrival to Tennessee State, he had served the previous tow years as the assistant head coach at the University of Cincinnati, wher he coached the defensive ends in 1995 and running backs in 1994.

He began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at the University of Nebraska in 1981, working with the defensive ends. Then, he moved to New Mexico State University for the 1982 and 1983 seasons as the defensive ends coach.


Cole continued moving up the coaching ladder working with the defensive ends at Ball State University for two seasons (1984-1985). He also worked along side of current Cincinnati head coach Rick Minter, who was Ball State's defensive coordinator at the time. cole went on to become the inside linebackers' coach at Kansas State

University for the 1986 and 1987 seasons and the outside linebackers' coach at the University of Wisconsin for the 1988 and 1989 campaigns.

Cole coached the running backs as an assistant coach at the University of Toledo in 1990 before making the switch to Morgan State University as the defensive coordinator from 1991-1992. Before taking the position with the University of Cincinnati, he was the assistant head

coach and special teams coordinator at Eastern Michigan University in 1993 as well as directing the running backs.

A native of Dayton, Ohio, Cole was a football and basketball all-state selection at Dayton's Dunbar High. He was a three year starter at defensive end at the University of Nebraska, earning a bachelor's degree in 1980. He was also an All-Big-Eight selection and team captain while participating in four bowl



games. Plus, he played one year for the New York Jets in 1980 before joining the coaching profession.

The fourth of nine brothers, which includes TSU's offensive coordinator Johnnie Cole, Cole was born on January 3, 1956, in Springfield, Ohio. He is married to the former Mitzi Parker of Madison, Wisconsin. They have one child, Lawrence Timothy Clay (10 months).

Tennessee State Coaching Staff



Jake Cabell Defensive Coordinator

A native of Danville, Va., Jake Cabell begins his third year with the Tigers. Before joining the staff at Tennessee State, Cabell was the defensive coordinator at Iowa Wesleyan College. He began his coaching career as a part-time assistant secondary coach at the University of Nebraska from 1977-79, while completing his master's degree. Cabell was an assistant at Eastern Washington, Oregon State and Western Illinois, and was a head coach at Southwestern College (Kan.) in 1992, where his 5-4 squad ranked sixth nationally in the junior college ranks.

Johnnie Cole Offensive Coordinator

Johnnie Cole, younger brother of head coach L.C. Cole, is in his third year affiliated with Tennessee State University. Cole was an assistant coach at the University of Cincinnati prior to his arrival at TSU. In addition, he was the wide receivers' coach at Southern University in 1993 and 1994. While at Southern, he helped develop Frederick Bailey, the school's all-time leading pass receiver. Following the 1994 season, he left Southern University to become defensive coordinator of the Hamburg (Germany) Blue Devils of the Football League of Europe.

Reese can take partial credit for former tailback Darron Davis establishing numerous TSU rushing records, including most yards in a season and career. The Nashville native attended Whites Creek High School. He received his bachelor's degree in business administration from Tennessee State in 1991. Later, in 1995, he added a master's degree in educational administration supervision from TSU.





