


Dr. Otis Floyd, Jr., vice-president for administration at Middle Tennessee State University, assumed duties as interim president of Tennessee State University on June 16. Floyd succeeds interim president Dr. Roy P. Peterson, who has returned to the Kentucky Higher Council as an administrator.

Floyd, originally from McNairy County, Tenn., was born Feb. 16, 1928. He presently resides in Smyrna, Tenn.

He received his bachelor's degree in Social Science from Lane College, Jackson, Tenn., master's degree in Administration and Supervision from Tennessee State University and doctorate degree in Administration and Supervision from Memphis State University.

Floyd served as vice president of administration at Middle Tennessee State University since october, 1984. He served as executive assistant to the president at Middle Tennessee State University from 1981-84.

His wealth of knowledge in the field of education and administration has enabled him to serve as Director of Field Services and Learning Resources, Tennessee Department of Education, 1973-75, Deputy Commissioner of Education for the Tennessee Department, 1975-79 and Commissioner of Education, 1978-79.

He does not limit his expertise in education and administration but also lends himself to various community and professional organizations such as the Murfreesboro Rotary Club, United Way and Guidance Center Board of Directors. He is a Sunday School teacher, Scout Master, Boy Scouts, and a member of the stewardship and finance committees of the Methodist Church.



He is also a member of Alpha Phi Alpha fraternity, National Association of Public School Educators, Tennessee Association of Supervision and Curriculum Development, American Association of School Administrators and Tennessee School Board Association.

He was instrumental in developing various federal programs for the Hardin Couanty school system.

He is married and has four children—Reginald, Otis III, Sylvia and Paulette.

Howard Cornelius Gentry, Sr.

Howard Cornelius Gentry, Sr., 65, returned to Tennessee State University in May 1986 as Interim Athletic Director, following a 10 year retirement from the university. Gentry first served as athletic director at Tennessee State University from 1971-76.

Gentry is a native of Columbus, Ohio. He earned a bachelor's degree from Florida A & M in Health and Physical Education from Ohio State University in 1952.



The renowned legend has touched the lives of many in the field of athletics. He served as assistant football coach and instructor in Health and Physical Education at North Carolina A & T College during 1946-48. He was assistant football coach and instructor in Health and Physical Education at Central State University 1948-49. Gentry served as head football coach and association professor of Health, where his coaching record shows a sparkling 42 wins, 10 lost and 1 tie. His 1956—ten wins 10-0 and his 59— squad was 9-1, Physical Education at Tennessee State University from 1955-61.

Not only has Gentry excelled in the field of athletics, but he also lends himself to various community and professional organizations. He is a lifetime member of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People; chairman, Board of Directors, First Baptist Church Capitol Hill Homes Inc., (Kelly Miller Smith Towers); and a member of the Board of Directors, Optimist Club of Central Nashville. Gentry also holds membership in the Nashville Urban League and Advisory Council of the Nashville Public Television.

His professional affiliations and offices include secretary, National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics; chairman, NCAA Division II Basketball Tournament Committee; member, American Football Coaches Association and member of the American Alliance for Health, Physical Education and Recreation.

He recently was instrumental in TSU becoming a member of the Ohio Valley Conference.

He is married to Carrie Louise McLaughlin and has two children—Howard C. Jr. and Carol.

Gentry succeeds Gale Sayers who served as interim athletic director from September 1985 to May 1986.

— The Coach — William A. Thomas

William Alfonso Thomas is the only head football coach in TSU's history that played and came up through the ranks at his Alma Mater. Thomas' elevation was consumated through his value of hard work and patience. Thomas, a '70 graduate in Physical Education was named head gridiron mentor by former TSU President Dr. Frederick S. Humphries following the death of the University's legendary coach "Big John" Merritt.

37-year old Thomas, who in his second year as the head mentor completed a perfect season by winning 11 games against no defeats and last season he led the Big Blue to a 7-4 season giving him an 18-4 overall 2-year record.

No doubt pleased at this stage in his professional life, Thomas said "I've tried to impress this upon our alumni and supporters that we're entering a new era in TSU football. If you want to build a solid program with a good philosophy, you must move slowly — in this way, TSU can keep a good football team for a long time."

Thomas, who has coached at TSU for 13 years holds the M.A. degree in Physical Education for TSU and his studied administration at Middle Tennessee State University. He is an assistant professor in the Department of Health, Physical Education and Recreation, in addition to his coaching duties. As a player himself, Thomas was a middle linbacker under Coach Joe Gilliam and Coach Merritt. Bill played or coached on four TSU National Championship teams, his senior year, the Tigers, went undefeated. In 1967, TSU was 6-3, 1968, 5-2-2, 1969, 8-1 and 1970, 11-0, plus a Grantland Rice Bowl win over Southwestern Louisiana, 26-25 (30-6-2 four year span).

Thomas studied as a graduate assistant for two years, then he was hired as academic counselor and coach for one year after completing graduate work. At this point he was placed on the faculty as an instructor and as Joe Gilliam's Senior Assistant. In 1980 when Coach Alvin "Cat" Coleman retired, Thomas moved up as Defensive Coordinator. Thomas has received great praise for some defensive gems he has pulled off in those three years, plus having the TSU defensive units ranked nationally each year in total defense.

Thomas reflects back to his teaching from his brilliant coaches, Merritt and Gilliam, which he took from them and intermixed their knowledge and philosophy and came up with his own that also is productive. The young, fiery mentor of the Big Blue program looks to the future with renewed excitement as he foresees more attention in the academic, student-life involvement of college players, who have come to TSU to receive a college degree.

A super recruiter and player motivator, the future of this young coach is truely unlimited. He is married to Gayla Boyd from Dayton, Ohio and they are the parents of Tosha Bille' Thomas.

He is the new Equipment Manager for the Big Blue Tigers replacing Bruce Strickland and is single.



Third year coach William "Bill Thomas at Tennessee Statewill welcome 80 football returnees out for the 1986 fall practice at Hale Statium. TSU last season ended it's record with a 7-4 mark. Thomas looks to this fall practice as a proving ground for the 80 returnees with no position locked in by anyone on the squad.

OL - Thomas indicates that the first order of business is to establish the offensive oine into an intimidating force, more than the finese line of last season. The Big Blue lost standouts Rod Adams, Eric Spears, and Curtis Mackey for last season linemen. There will be a tiger fight for each position with Alvin Street, Keith Tarver, and Wade Strickland establishing a more intense and physical force up front. They will be supported by John Elder, Tommy Faison, James Braden and Allif Dove. "The hitters will be starters" says,

QB - The Big Question will be at WB. Gone is former passing great Gilbert Renfroe, who will take his place? Offensive coordinator Sylvester Collins cites, "At this point and stage we have three quarterback waiting in the wings, they are athletes with intelligence and skills, they have performed well in practice, but now its' time for the leader of the pack to step forward. They are Stacy Grear 6-4, Leon Garlington 602, and Chauncey Hines 602, and they will

be representing our PASSING for the

RB - The Tigers will miss RB Marlon Johnson, who was the leading rusher last year. Steve Griffin, Robert Brannon, Quintin Crawford, and Harold Miles are the key returnees. Newcomers are Eric Bray, and Dion Martinl and they will be given a good chance to move up this spring. The coaching staff will be looking to improve the inside running and blocking of the running backs.

TE - With the loss of Riley Walton, who was injured last season, this position become as important as any with Steve Holloway now being expected to come through with receiving and blocking in and over the middle to make TSU's pass-happy offense to be successful. He will have two 6-4 challengers in Victor Winfrey, Tyrone Watson and Ricky Hockett a 6-5 receiver from Nashville all making their pitch for that

WR - Gone is Quentin Johnson, but returning will be a corp of receivers that has all started a one time or another last year. They include Bart Evans, Rodney Patrick, Frank Pillow, and they will be challenged by Tim Thompson, Steve Studdard, Terrance Harris. Others who will play include Romannie Marsalis, Quentin Smith and red-shirt Zack Lewis.

K - Joe Guydon will handle the placing kicking, with his improved range from the field. Jeffrey Troutman will be expected to doing the punting for the

Defensive coordinator Craig Gilliam has suffered key losses in his Nationally ranked unit (last season they finished 5th in Total defense with a 277.1 yard yield/game with the loss of NG Mike Robinson, LB James Derico. LB Tim Loyd, and DT Jeffrey Chatman. This group represents 40% of the tackles made by the Tigers. "Replacing these quality players will not be an easy


task", cites Gilliam. He continues, "Individual-Technique-Execution-Improvement will be the main objective of the coaching staff this spring. We must improve our pass rush, and of course stopping the big play has to be ranked at the top. Our 7-4 record of last season was a direct result of our inability to stop the long pass."

DL - Returning linemen include: Lawrence Mims, Harold Tusks, Lewis Leeper, Steve Dowdell, Freshman starter Christ Sims from Nashville, Barry Nixon, Thaddus Howard, and Aaron Kimbrough should give the defense some added strength. Marlon Dean will be back after sitting out a season on NCAA probation. Then there will be Charles Buchannon also back after the NCAA probation will be played at both LB and DT.

LB - 3-year starter Onzy Elam and 2year starter Bryan Williams will be the key linebackers returning. Other LBs include Mike Lucas, Rod Rood, son of a former TSU All-American, Robert Reed, Sr., and Fred Robinson will be fight off competitors.

DB - Sporting News All-American Carl McAfee, will be handling the strong safety position and should take up where he left off with 82 tackles, and if he can improve on that LOOK OUT. Other possible starter include Roger strong corner, Albert Thomas at weak corner, and the safety will be senior Robert Hall. Ben Robinson, Mike Armstrong, Ronald Johnson, and Terry Welch make up the support in the secondary. Freshmen Anthony Shelton, Tony Stargell, and Joe Stone compose a group of upcoming challenger.


























THE OHIO VALLEY CONFERENCE-

One of the premier NCAA Division I-AA conferences in the country, the Ohio Valley Conference strengthened its position last summer by welcoming I-AA perennial contender Tennessee State to the league. The OVC will be composed of nine teams this year: Akron, Austin Peay, Eastern Kentucky, Middle Tennessee, Morehead State, Murray State, Tennessee State, Tennessee Tech, and Youngstown State.

The concept of forming the OVC came into being in 1941. However, due to World War II and its effects on collegiate athletics, a good idea had to wait until 1948, when Murray State, Morehead State, Eastern Kentucky, Western Kentucky, Louisville, and Evansville joined forces to charter the organization. The six were soon joined by Tennessee Tech and Marshall.

The face of the conference has changed over the years and continues to change. Middle Tennessee joined the league in 1952 to replace Louisville, which became independent in 1949. In 1952 Evansville and Marshall departed, to be replaced by East Tennessee in 1957 and Austin Peay in 1962. East Tennessee went its separate way in 1978. Akron then joined in 1980, followed by Youngstown State in 1981. Western Kentucky withdrew in 1982.

The addition of Tennessee State swells the ranks of the OVC to nine for the second time in its history; however, like in 1981, the expansion is only temporary, as Akron has announced its plans to sever ties with the conference at the end of the 1986-87 season.

In 1955, the NCAA formally recognized the OVC as a major basketball conference, giving the league's champion an automatic bid to the post-season NCAA tournament.

At the time, the OVC was only the second six-team conference to obtain major status from the NCAA, Prior to 1955. Murray State, Western Kentucky, and Eastern Kentucky were the only OVC members ranked as major basketball powers.

For many years, the OVC has had representatives in top holiday and post-season basketball tournaments. With continual strong showings against conference and non-conference foes alike, OVC football has gained a national following and consistently places two teams in the I-AA playoffs. The league also has won recognition for its programs in baseball, track, golf.

Overseeing the league's continued growth is commissioner James Delany, formerly a staff member of the NCAA. A native of Succasunna, N.J., he was co-captain of the 1969-70 North Carolina basketball team and later was an assistant under Tar Heels coach Dean Smith.

Delany is the OVC's fourth commissioner since its inception, succeeding Art Guepe (1963-75), Paul Dietzel (1975-76), and Bob Vanatta (1976-79). The league's information director is Jon Verner. Technically speaking, it's all in the tongue

Not only are Bobby Ferrell and Dr. Harry Beamon members of the Middle Tennessee Basketball Officials' Assn., but the Nashville pair also have educational ties. Ferrell, 33, is a graduate student of Dr. Beamon, 43, at Tennessee State University, where Beamon is the head of the Health, Physical Education and Recreation Dept.

As the supervisor of officials in the Middle Tennessee College Officials' Assn., Beamon also has responsibility for instructing fellow officials. How does Beamon instruct his group to handle angry coaches? One incident Beamon recalled may offer insight.

Ferrell has worked basketball at the high school level for five years. A teacher/coach at Litton Middle School, he recalled that after his first year of junior high games he was ready for bigger and better things on the court.


"After my first year," said Ferrell, who has been married to Brenda for six years, "I thought I was ready for the big time. So, I went about writing the NBA and obtaining letters of recommendation from area coaches and officials, in order to qualify for pro camp.

"After a few weeks, I received a letter telling me of a pro camp in Atlanta with (NBA referee) Jack Madden as the instructor. That was all I needed, so it was off to Atlanta. The first half I worked there, I threw out all my mechanics and signals. The second half I had learned how to cut off the court, and after the third half, I was a new official. Jack was a great instructor."

Ferrell has also worked volleyball for the past five seasons. He and Brenda have one son.



1986 NCAA I-AA Football

As a result of the restructuring of the NCAA's football Division I-AA (now in its ninth year of existence), the 1986 I-AA championship play-off is tentatively scheduled to feature 16 teams this fall.

The first round games will be played November 29; the quarterfinals and semifinals will be December 6 and 13; and the championship game will be played the weekend of Dec. 19-21, in the Tacoma (Wash.) Dome.

Six conferences (Big Sky, Mid-Eastern Athletic, Ohio Valley, Southern, Southland and Yankee) will receive automatic bids to the play-offs. The remaining teams in the field will be selected on an at-large basis. All I-AA teams will be located in one of four regions - West, Central, South and East. NYSP Leaves a Lasting Impression

For the past 16 years, the National Youth Sports Program (NYSP) has provided the opportunity for youth from disadvantaged backgrounds to receive benefits from a stuctured sports and enrichment program held at a local college or university facility. These activities are provided at no cost to the participants.

Approximately 55,000 youngsters nationwide participated in 1986. Each project is organized into two areas: an activity program that includes instruction and competition in a variety of sports, and an enrichment program that includes instruction in substance abuse, nutrition, personal health, and career and educational opportunities.

Economically disadvantaged young people are introduced to a collegiate environment and receive instruction from highly trained staff members to enhance sports skills and self concept. Boys and girls, ages 10 through 16 years old, are eligible to participate in the program which took place at 140 colleges and universities in 42 states in 1986. The NYSP program is effective June 1 through August 31 on five-week, five-days-per-week or six-week, fourdays-per-week schedules.

Each participant receives a free medical examination. Any previously undetected physical problems that are identified receive adeauate follow-up treatment: one full USDAapproved meal and snack also are provided on a daily basis.

The NYSP motto is "walk tall, talk tall and stand tall." The objective is that each person involved with the summer program exemplify this by the end of the project.

Naming a street after John Merritt? Why, how flattering!

Having survived 29 seasons of college football warfare and over 35 in coaching altogether is enough of a tribute to the veteran Tennessee State coach who has over 200 wins to his credit. Effective April 24, 1982, the strip of street that runs through the middle of TSU campus will

become "John Ayers Merritt Boulevard," from its old Centennial Boulevard name.

"Imagine anyone wanting to name a street after me," Merritt laughed just as his team moved into the midst of spring football practice, preparing for what will be his 20th year at the Big Blue helm.

"I'm as flattered as I can be, and I am really touched that I can become an even greater part of the Big Blue tradition by having a permanent reminder for fans who travel here to see our football team. Today is a very touching moment for me and my family, and all of my

Merritt is thankful these days that he is even alive to be a part of the celebration on the official day of naming a street in his honor. This past November, he spent nearly a month in Vanderbilt Hospital, recovering from a high blood pressure ailment that has bothered him in recent years. And two years ago, officials feared for his very life as a similar ailment kept him confined in Westside Hospital.

But when springtime rolled around, Merritt made the announcement that so many around the scene thought he would: that he would stay on as coach of TSU. Officials, perhaps fearing that a man this rare and genuine, a blessing to TSU sports, may not get to see it soon, probably hurried in a gesture to name the street in his honor.

Having spent his childhood in a very poor section of Falmouth, Kentucky, during the days of the depression, Coach Merritt has seen the worst of hard times. He worked, running a delivery truck to support himself through high school.

After much deliberation as to whether to turn to the ministry or become a football coach, Merritt chose the latter. He began his career as coach at Versailles (Ky.) High School, later moved on to become Head Coach at Jackson State in Mississippi in 1953, then took the TSU

post in 1963. His teams are 155-31-5 at TSU, and 215-64-9 overall. Merritt has seen almost 200 of his players drafted into the pro ranks, the most famous of whom may be Ed "Too Tall" Jones with the Dallas Cowboys. His folklore, humorous stories. and after-dinner speeches are almost legendary, and he touches all who venture near him.

All of the TSU and Nashville community can take pride in having this man in their midst. And by noticing a man who has had one of the greatest influences on TSU athletics in its long and proud history, they pay tribute by naming the street: JOHN AYERS MERRITT BOULEVARD.

The celebration, a festival including community merchants, churches and artists, is tentatively planned to coincide with Tennessee State University's annual homecoming activities.

"We want to get students, faculty, staff, alumni, residents, business people, churches—as many people as possible involved in the project. We want this to be an exciting and fun event, and we also want it to be something that will be remembered for years to come."
