Enrollment Reported

The fall enrollment at TSU is 5,249 students. According to Dr. George A. Pruitt, this figure was the official head count enrollment that was presented to the State Board of Regents. The tabulation includes 292 students who are enrolled in continuing education units.

The University's six residence halls are occupied by 2071 students. There are only 81 combined vacancies. The largest number of vacancies are in Wilson Hall (27), which is the largest hall, and Boyd Hall (21).

President Schedules Faculty Meetings

THREE ADDED TO ENGINEERING FACULTY

Three new faculty members have been added to the Department of Electrical Engineering. They are Dr. Kun-Shan Lin, assistant professor, Dr. Ronald L. Wadsack, and Dr. Bradford Frank Hadnot, both visiting adjunct professors.

Lin is from Taiwan, China. He earned the B.S. degree in Control Engineering from the National Chiao Tung University and the M.S.E.E. and Ph.D. from the University of New Mexico, Albuquerque. From 1976 to 1977 he was an adjunct professor and a research associate at the University of New Mexico. He taught electrical engineering and worked on a research grant from the National Science Foundation in the Coherent Optical Image processing. Lin is a member of IEEE and the Optical Society of America.

Wadsack is on a one year field assignment from Bell Telephone Laboratories, Murray Hill, N. J. He has a doctorate degree in Applied Quantum Physics from Yale University, where he was a National Science Foundation graduate fellow, and masters degrees in Electrical Engineering from Yale University of Washington. At Bell Labs he has worked in the areas of magnetic and semiconductor memory systems, laser PCM Systems, and computer-controlled (continued on page 4)

ALFRED SHARPE, JR. PURCHASING DEPARTMENT

The Purchasing Department is one of the most important departments on the campus, but few people realize this, according to Alfred Sharpe, Jr., director.

"One major function is to aid departments in selecting furniture, material and machinery. We purchase everything from airplanes to toilet tissue," Sharpe said.

This department is not in the "lime light" but if t didn't function the school could not operate.

"We operate strictly on a business basis. We have State rules and regulations to follow, and we do." Sharpe commented. "Favortism is never shown to a particular company. Before purchasing any product, bids are entertained from five companies. This is done to save money. This procedure is the key for maintaining good public relations with businesses. "You are always aware of the fact that you are going to help one company make money, and four companies money," he said.

Their work begins with the requisition and ends hen the merchandise is delivered to the departments. "Approximately

10,000 requisitions go through this department per year," Sharpe said.


The Purchasing Department is relatively young as a separate and major department here. It used to be a part of the Business Office. "We needed space of our own," Sharpe said, "because we had expanded a great deal."

Sharpe is the first director of Purchasing. He has held this position since 1970. His staff consists of six people. "We are three persons short, but I am very well pleased with the work we produce," Sharpe commented.

He encourages Business Administration and Engineering majors to become interested in this field.
