Tennessee A. & I. State College held its Thirty-second Annual Commencement on June 5, at 10:00 A. M. at which time President John W. Davis of West Virginia State College delivered the Commencement Address to 116 candidates for the Bachelor's degree and one candidate for the Gradnate degree.

FIRST MASTER'S DEGREE CONFERRED

Mrs. Martha W. Wheeler, honor graduate of Shaw University and granddaughter of Mr. John Merrick, founder of the North Carolina Mutual Life Insurance Company, was the first Master's degree candidate in the history of the college. The college first con-

terred the Bachelor's degree in 1924.

Dean G. W. Gore, Jr., presented the graduates to President W. S. Davis, who conferred the degrees. Diplomas were presented by Mr. A. W. Carroll, assistant State Commissioner of Education, who addressed the members of the graduating class.

Agora Assembly Presents Third Sunday Service

The Agora Assembly, an organization composed of many of the leading professional men of the city, sponsored the May Third Sunday Service at A. & I. State College.

Dr. W. H. Grant of Meharry Medical College, spoke on the subject, "Tropical Medicine in Postwar America."

As the result of a recent study of tropical diseases. Dr. Grant emphasized the need for a more general knowledge of facts and information pertaining to specific diseases of a tropical nature. In this connection, Dr. Grant pointed out that thousands of soldiers now exposed to tropical diseases will at the close of the war return to the states, thus making the issue a concern of all the people and the physician in particular. "Present enlightcument is, therefore, necessary to care for a postwar period that will see many new diseases," declared Dr. Grant.

A question and answer period following the lecture was conducted by Dr. W. S. Quinland of Meharry Medical College.
