## Financial aid information

Financial Aid Forms (FAF) for the 1981-82 school year are available in the Financial Aid office, room 306, Administration Building, main campus or room 346 on the downtown campus. All students who would like to be considered for financial aid next school year are urged to come to the Financial Aid Office and get an FAF and an application for financial aid before departing campus for the Christmas holidays. These forms should be completed according to instructions and mailed shortly after January 1, 1981. *Please read all instructions carefully.* Please be advised that the Student Consumer Information Guide is available upon request from the Financial Aid Office.

All students (graduate, undergraduate, dependent, and independent) must file the FAF for 1981-82 if they want to be considered for aid.

All undergraduate students are urged to check Item 41, number 1, so that their BEOG eligibility will be determined from the financial data on the FAF. *Students who check Item 41, number 1 will not need to submit a BEOG application.* All students must enter Tennessee State University and code 1803 in Item 42 if the form is not already so stamped.

TENNESSEANS are urged to read the Tennessee Student

Assistance Award Program instruction sheet and apply for a Tennessee Student Assistance Award by completing Item 45 A-B-C-D and E. They should also enter Tennessee Student Assistance Corporation and its code, 0023, in Item 42. Again, we urge all undergraduate Tennessee students to apply for the TSAC awards early. It is need based and will be awarded on a first come basis.

Since it takes about six weeks for this form to be processed and returned, you, together with your parents, should complete the FAF and application for financial aid according to instructions as soon as your parents know their total 1980 income. The income on the FAF is to be identical to the 1980 income that is to be included on the U.S. Income Tax Form (1040 or 1040A) for 1980.

April 1 is our deadline for renewal students to complete their files and May 1 is our deadline for new students. Therefore, we urge you to mail all forms at least two or three months prior to these deadline dates.

All financial aid awards for the 1981-82 school year will be made based on the assumption that you will enroll on a full-time basis, minimum 12 semester hours. However, it is recommended that a student carry 16 or 17 hours each

semester so the student may graduate on time. Students who register for six to eleven hours will cause an over award. Therefore, the award will be reduced and the over award must be repaid immediately. Students who register for less than six hours are not eligible for BEOG-NDSL-NSL-NSS or GSL funds.

If a student's parents have not completed their 1980 U.S. Income Tax Form 1040 or 1040A when they complete the FAF, and therefore do not know how much income tax they will pay, please write zero in Item 24 on the FAF. Do not write the amount withheld from earnings as shown on the W-2 Form.

In Item 22 enter the number of exemptions reported on line 7 of parents' 1980 U.S. Income Tax Form 1040 or line 6 of Form 1040A. If your parents are not filing a 1980 U.S. income tax return, enter zero.

In Item 16 enter the total number of persons for whom parents will provide more than one-half support between July 1, 1981 and June 30, 1982. This figure would include the student if s/he is a dependent. Students who are filing as independents can claim their wife and/or children. They cannot claim other persons who may live at the same house but for whom they do not support, or cannot claim as a U.S. Income Tax deduction.

## Library services explained

There have been various gripes and complaints from TSU students concerning library services on campus over the past years.

One of the major complaints made by TSU students concerns the lack of books in the library. "The library could use some new books," according to Dr. Francher, Director of Libraries and Learning Resources, but nevertheless "The old books are classics and will always be there," she said. However, "Books have been weeded out," said Dr. Francher, apparently those of no further significance.

Also, Dr. Francher said that students aren't likely to find any material at the downtown campus library, that they won't find at the main campus branch. But most students believe that this isn't so. The book budget has also been cut, according to Dr. Francher. Last year's budget was \$212,000, and the budget this year is only \$127,000. This budget cut may have affected the number of books being brought for the library.

TSU students have also inquired about the library's resources on black literature and history. "These

materials might be insufficient, but if students would just let us know what they need, it could be gotten," said Dr. Francher. She suggests that students urge their instructors to order such materials.

There is a special section in the library entitled "TSU History." It contains TSU documents, yearbooks and school newspaper dating back to their origins, catalogues dating back to 1912, every copy of any thesis that has been written at TSU, and "other odds and ends," according to Dr. Francher.

If anyone desires admittance to this section, they are asked to contact Ms. McHollins in the reference section. However, if she cannot be reached, Dr. Francher said she would be willing to assist.

Dr. Francher describes the temperature in the library as "too cold in the summer, and too hot in the winter." She has exhausted every possible means in adjusting the temperature, but will continue to search for a solution.

Dr. Francher stated that she would like to commend students on their up keep of the facility, and urges them to keep up the good work.

## Commentary: Fight for the Voting Rights Act

First, I would like to extend my appreciation to all the individuals who participated in the march on Reverend Dr. Martin Luther King's birthday on January 15, 1981.

It is most important for churches, labor unions, civil rights groups, people in the business world, college campuses, civic organizations, the

professions, and social organizations to mobilize together to prevent a serious erosion during the next four years of the social, political, and economic progress made in the last 20 years. The topics that I am talking about is just one out of many, the Voting Rights Act.

This law, which was enacted in 1965 and renewed in 1970 and 1975, is now scheduled to expire in 1982. We all know it must be extended again, to protect the right of millions of Black and other minority voters. Many people gave their lives in the non-violent struggle of the 1960's for the right to vote. Yet Senator Stow Thurmond of South Carolina, the new chairman of the Senate Judiciary Committee which has jurisdiction over the Voting Rights Act, says that the law should be repealed.

Let me tell you what might happen if the Voting Rights Act were repealed or expired. The original Act identified southern states and areas within states where there had been a pattern of racial discrimination in registration and voting. The Act empowered the Justice Department to send federal voter registrars to those places where there was continued resistance to Black political participation, and federal examiners to monitor the conduct of elections. These federal registrars and examiners have never been extensively used, but at least the possibility of sending them to the

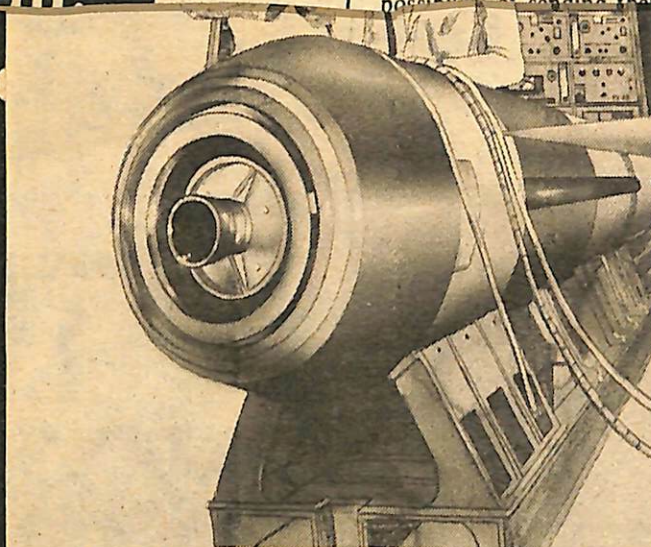

illusion.

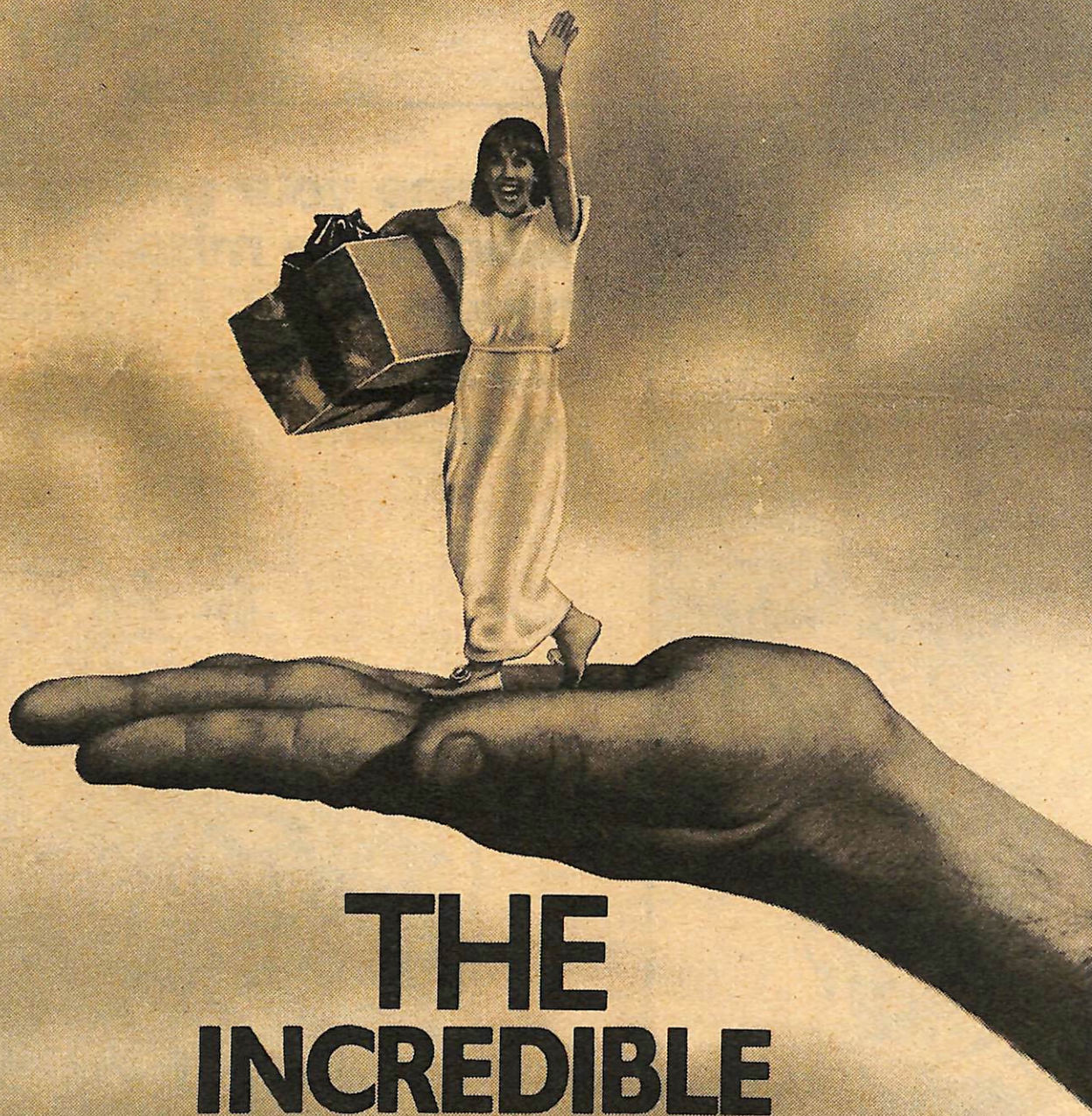

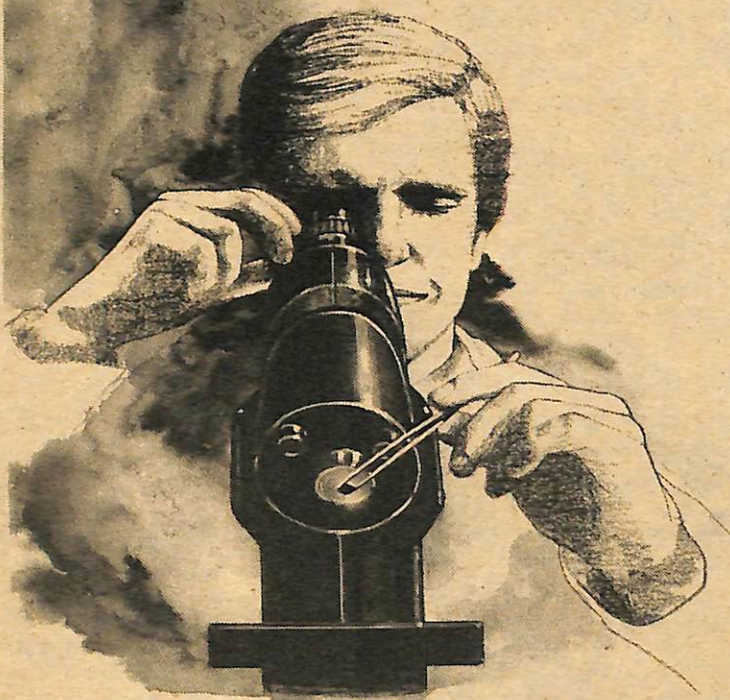

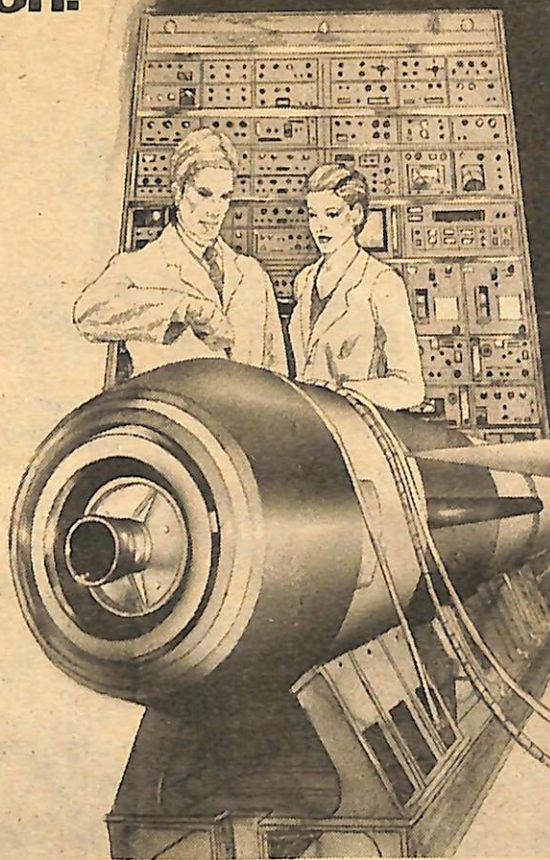

## Skywalker comes alive

Junior guard Larry "Skywalker" Wilson scored 14 first-half points, including a pace-setting slam-dunk with 8:53 remaining in the half, as Tennessee State's Tigers trounced the Jackson State Tigers 94-58, last Saturday night.

Wilson finished with 20 points and TSU's aggressive defense stymied JSU's offense throughout the game.

The game was tied only once; that was with 16:08 remaining in the first half, from that point on it was all TSU. The Tigers led by 17 points at the end of the half.

In the second half TSU's Jonathan Green, who scored 15 points and grabbed 13 rebounds earlier, sat out due to illness.

Despite Green's absence in the second half, the Tigers continued to dominate. The Tigers, who led 42-25 at the half, added ten additional points to surpass their first half performance.

James Kears scored 11 points, Ronnie Cage followed with ten and James Teague had eight.

The Tigers also did a great job from the Charity-Stripe. Larry Wilson was four for four, James Kears was three for three and Carlos Jones was four for four. Gary Lisenbee had a good night on the boards grabbing nine rebounds.

Jackson State's leading scorers were Northern Shavers with 23 points and Donald Seals, who had 16. Audie Norris, JSU's center accomplished little of nothing in the game. He had four fouls at the end of the first half and picked up his fifth with 12:48 remaining in the game. Norris went to the bench with a mere four points and three rebounds.

TSU, who evened their record at 8-8, will face Prairie View on January 30 at home and will have played the Rattlers of FAMU on Jan. 27.

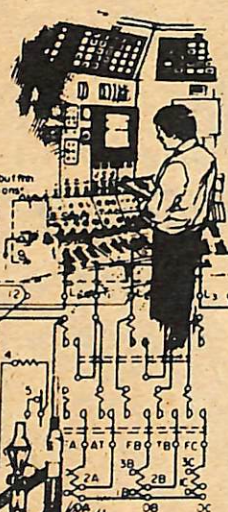

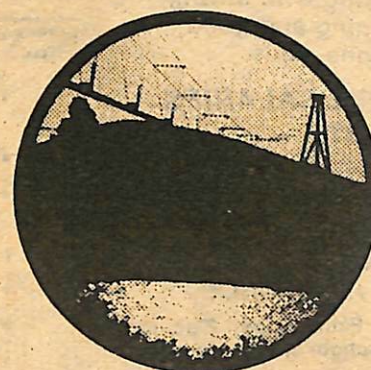
