FIVE FOOTBALL TIGERS ARE INELIGIBLE...

FOR POST-SEASON GRIDIRON COMPETITION UNDER NATIONAL COLLEGIATE ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION(NCAA) SPONSORSHIP. THE NCAA RULES ALSO LIMITS THE PLAY-OFF AND CHAMPIONSHIP GAME SOUADS TO 42 PLAY-ERS EACH. THESE ARE THE REASONS BEHIND THE UNIVERSITY'S DECISION TO N O T LET THE UPI-AP NO.1 TIGERS COMPETE IN THE 1973 COLLEGIATE DIVISION II FOOTBALL CHAMPIONSHIP GAMES. THE INELIGI-BLE TIGERS (ALL OF WHOM HAVE PLAYED FOUR YEARS OF FOOTBALL AT TSU, INCLUDING THEIR FRESHMAN SAR) ARE ED "TOO TALL" JONES, CARL WAFER, SHAWNEY WYNN, JOHN HOLLAND, AND GREGORY KINDLE. THIS, PLUS THE HARD JOB OF DECIDING WHICH PLAYERS TO LEAVE BEHIND IN GETTING TOGETHER THE LIMITED SQUAD, HAS THE PLAYERS, THE COACHES, THE ATHLETIC DIRECTOR, HOWARD C. GENTRY, AND THE UNIVERSITY PRESIDENT, DR. A. P. TORRENCE, ALL IN AGREEMENT THAT THE NUMBER ONE BIG BLUE TIGERS SHOULD SKIP THIS YEAR FOR PLAYING IN A POST-SEASON BOWL GAME. THE TIGERS ARE CONFIDENT THAT THEY COULD WIN ANYWAY, BUT FEEL IT WOULD BE UNFAIR, AND NOT MUCH FUN, TO GO INTO POST-SEASON PLAY WITHOUT THEIR TEAMMATES AND CLOSE-KNIT BUDDIES WHO HELPED MAKE THEIR 1973 SEASON SO GREAT! THE TIGERS ARE ALSO HOPING THAT, FOR THE FUTURE, THE NCAA WILL CHANGE ITS RULING, WHICH BASIC-ALLY RENDERS A PLAYER INELIGIBLE FOR POST SEASON NCAA COMPETITION (ONLY) IF HE PLAYED VARSITY FOOTBALL AS A FRESHMAN. THEY'RE ALSO PULLING FOR A CHANGE IN THE RULING ABOUT LIMITING THE SQUAD TO 42 PLAYERS. THE TIGERS HOPE THAT THEIR FANS WILL NOT BE TOO DISAPPOINTED, WILL SYMPA-THIZE WITH THEIR CAUSE AND THAT ALL WILL ROOT FOR THEM TOMORROW AFTERNOON IN THEIR LAST GAME OF THE SEASON AGAINST THE ALABAMA STATE HORNETS, STARTING AT 1:30 P. M. IN W. J. HALE STAD-

NATIONAL ENERGY CRISIS COOPERATION...

IS BEING URGED BY UNIVERSITY PRESIDENT. DR. A. P. TORRENCE, BY ALL MEMBERS OF THE UNI-VERSITY COMMUNITY. DR. TORRENCE'S LIST OF COOPERATIVE RULES TO FOLLOW ARE: 1) DO NOT DRIVE MORE THAN 50 MILES PER HOUR ON THE HIGH-WAY. 2) USE CAR POOLS TO THE MAXIMUM EXTENT POSSIBLE AND SHARE THE RIDE WHEN TWO OR MORE PERSONS ARE MAKING OUT-OF-TOWN TRIPS BY CAR. 3) TURN OFF LIGHTS IN ROOMS THAT ARE NOT IN USE AND DURING DAYLIGHT HOURS WHEN THEY ARE NOT NEEDED. 4) KEEP DOORS AND WINDOWS CLOSED IN ORDER TO CONSERVE HEAT. 5) KEEP ALL HOT WATER FAUCETS CUT OFF TIGHTLY AND DO NOT USE HOT WATER EXCEPT WHEN ACTUALLY NEEDED. 6). KEEP ROOM TEMPERATURES NO HIGHER THAN 68 DE-GREES.
