



THIS ONE, SPONSORED BY NASHVILLE CITIZENS, IS TO BE HELD IN THE MEDITERRANEAN ROOM AT THE DOWN-TOWN SHERATON AND IS CHAIRED BY UNIVERSITY ALUMNA MRS. LETTIE GALLOWAY, DIRECTOR OF PATIENT WELFARE SERVICES AT THE MATTHEW WALKER HEALTH CENTER.

HAS BEEN ESTABLISHED BY MRS. JANET DUMAS KEYS, A 1934 GRADUATE OF THE UNIVERSITY AND NIECE OF MRS. ELLIOTT FOR WHOM THE UNIVERSITY'S FIRST MODERN CAFETERIA, FORMERLY LOCATED IN THE WOMEN'S BUILDING, WAS NAMED. THE \$100 SCHOLARSHIP IS TO BE AWARDED ANNUALLY, THROUGH THE ALUMNI DEVELOPMENT FUND, TO A YOUNG MAN OR YOUNG WOMAN, WHO, IN ADDITION TO NEED, IS AMBITIOUS AND PURPOSEFUL. THE RECIPIENT IS TO BE SELECTED BY A FACULTY COMMITTEE OF THREE, ONE OF WHOM MRS. KEYS HAS SPECIFIED SHOULD BE ALUMNI AFFAIRS DIRECTOR, MRS. GLADYS BURGESS ADAMS. MRS. KEYS IS PRESENTLY A GUIDANCE COUNSELOR IN THE CINCINNATI, OHIO SCHOOL SYSTEM.

### CAMPUS VISIT SESSIONS...

OF CANDIDATES FOR THE PRESIDENCY OF THE UNIVERSITY WILL BE TERMINATED WITH THE VISIT OF CANDIDATE NUMBER FOUR WHO WILL BE HERE THIS WEEKEND AND THE EARLY PART OF NEXT WEEK. THE NUMBER THREE CANDIDATE, DR. FREDERICK HUMPHREY, ENDED HIS VISIT EARLIER THIS WEEK. THE FIFTH CANDIDATE, BECAUSE OF PRESSING COMMITTMENTS, FINDS HIMSELF UNABLE TO VISIT THE CAMPUS AS ORIGINALLY PLANNED, DURING THE PERIOD PRIOR TO THE SCHEDULED OCTOBER 2 MEETING OF THE BOARD OF REGENTS. AT THIS MEETING, THE BOARD WILL SELECT AS THE UNIVERSITY'S NEW PRESIDENT, ONE FROM THE GROUP OF CANDIDATES WHO HAVE VISITED AND BEEN INTERVIEWED BY STUDENTS, FACULTY, STAFF, AND ALUMNI.
