

# Changes make Boyd better

Boyd Residence Hall has made changes and improvements in a concentrated effort to provide a more safe and accommodating environment for its residents.

Thomas Martin, vice president of student affairs, said one of his final tasks while in office, was to make Boyd a better living environment. In order to reach that goal, Boyd has undergone three changes: a change in management, structural renovations, and an officer acting as a law enforcer and mentor.

"We had gotten too many complaints about Boyd," said Dean of Housing, Peggy Earnest. "We decided it was time to make a change."

Due to complaints about the living environment and building conditions of Boyd Hall, Duane Smith, was removed from his position as director to Ford Residential Complex where he became the assistant director. The assistant director of the FRC, Shawn Modina, became the interim director in Boyd Hall.

Earnest said she felt Modina was the best person to handle the job and she was confident the he would make the proper changes. Both Modina and Smith declined to comment.

In addition to adding Modina, Boyd

# TSU athletes excel in academics

Tennessee State University athletes ranked third in academics among the eleven universities governed under the Ohio Valley Conference for the 2003-04 school term.

The OVC Academic Achievement Banner is annually awarded to the institution whose student-athletes have the top combined grade point average as compared to the average of the complete full-time undergraduate student body. The Jacksonville State University Gamecocks won this year's academic banner with 84 student athletes earning OVC medals of honor. JSU's student-athletes had a combined grade point average of 2.88, which surpassed

According to VH1, Nelly had enough material to contemplate releasing three albums in one day. Instead, he chose to release what will be his forth and fifth solo albums.

Sweat, the up-tempo, street savvy album boasts its first release as the Neptunes produced Flap Your Wings. Sweat also includes tracks featuring

## Honor code aims to increase academic honesty

A committee of Tennessee State students and administrators is creating an honor code in effort to encourage academic honesty.

The goal of the team, Committee to Promote Academic Integrity, is to promote academic honesty and create a Honor Council, consisting of reliable students who will serve as disciplinary

"I was struck that TSU did not have represent the students' commitment to an honor code," said Emily Orlando, Asst. Professor of English and committee member, who added she was surprised by the number of students who plagiarize in her English classes, "There have been many discussions of a greater need for academic integrity amongst the students' behavior when it comes to cheating."

The honor code will be in the form of a contract. It will state that the consequences of cheating or plagiarizing will be an automatic F on the assignment or in the course. The contract will be available to sign and the signatures will Academic Integrity is doing research on

academic integrity.

"We don't want TSU to be known as the weakest link, and we need to raise the respect for this university instead of embracing all the negatives we see too often in the newspapers," said Samantha A. Morgan-Curtis, chair of Committee to Promote Academic Integrity. "We want the students to know that we as teachers do care and this movement for academic integrity should be something that students should be involved in establish-

The Committee to Promote

honor codes at other universities, such as Duke, University of Southern California, and University of Tennessee at Knoxville, for guidance in creating an honor code for TSU.

"There is a great need for Academic integrity at this school because many students do not fully value their responsibility as scholars," said Student Government Association vice president, Rodriguez Johnson. "Cheating is like a white lie, you might feel like you're not doing anything wrong or harming anyone, but you really are.

## Tennessee State, Dell Computer team Up for new major

Dell computers, Inc. has given TSU a \$150,000 grant to support a new supply chain management program.

Dell, a leading computer manufacturer with a facility in Nashville awarded the grant to the College of Business to keep the university with the job market.

"We are excited about this partnership between Dell and TSU," said Tilden Curry, dean of the College of Business. "This grant shows Dell's commitment to the local community and reinforces TSU's standing as a world-class educational institution."

Tennessee State President James A. Hefner named Festus Olorunniwo head of the Department of Business Administration, to lead the new unit.

The program for supply chain management was advertised to students in fall 2003

"The recruitment is going really well," said Olorunniwo, " We have enrolled 14 people so far. "Students tend to announce their concentration in their junior and senior years. We expect an increase in student interest, especially from that group."

Graduates of the supply chain management program will be qualified for a variety of jobs that involve scheduling, purchasing, wholesaling, inventory management, transportation, packaging, retail stocking, database management, customer relationship management and data mining.


According to U.S. News and World Report, supply chain management is one of the hottest job areas of the 21st century, while logistics, a key component (of supply chain management), is the second largest employment sector in the United

"More companies are realizing that the supply chain is important to their businesses," said Olorunniwo. "Finding students with knowledge of the field is very valuable."

Negotiations over the grant began in November. The grant is to be used over the next three years to develop and promote the new undergraduate programs, recruit students, help secure quality internships for students and faculty and recruit faculty for the program.

"We look forward to offering a topof-the-line supply chain management program and the generous support from Dell will go a long way in helping us accomplish that," Tilden said.

Dell already recruits employees from TSU to its facilities in Nashville. The company describes itself as "a pre-





"I basically let the students choose who we bring to the concerts," Bell said. "Whoever receives the most votes on the survey is who we go with, as long as the artists are not too risqué."



# Tune technology may be newest campus amenity

Tennessee State University officials are working toward purchasing the university's first system for students to legally download music from the Net.

Plans to purchase the online database began in the summer of 2004, when the Tennessee Board of Regents (TBR) weighed the option of purchasing a system-wide, online database for all universities in the TBR system.

"TBR initially adopted the idea and wanted to make it system-wide," said Bob Adams, TBR vice chancellor for business and finance. "But there was not enough support from the TBR universities to do a statewide contract for the service."

The best deal that TBR officials found was a service that offered the music downloads for \$10 per month for each student, which would average approximately \$50 per semester for each student.

While no final decisions were made as to how the service would be paid for, one suggestion was that the cost of the service would be included in student activity fees.

"Some members at various institutions thought it would be unfair to add the charges to tuition costs because all students would be forced to pay when all students may not use the service," Adams said.

Because of the lack of university interest TBR tabled the idea of purchasing a service for the entire system, but TBR universities were given the permission to pursue the purchase of a downloading system individually.

According to Adams, TSU was the university with the strongest interest in purchasing a system for its students. Dr. Dennis Gendron and Howard Gentry of TSU's Technology and Administrative Services have both been working to explore various providers of music downloading services to see what services would be most cost effective and beneficial to the TSU student body.

"We wanted to purchase a monitored and controlled downloading system for our students because it is the legal and ethical thing to do," Gendron said.

Gendron and other university officials considered purchasing a Napster service similar to Vanderbilt University's

new VUmix, a Napster-based service which Vanderbilt students will begin using on Oct. 1. The Napster service was ruled out as a possibility because it was not the most cost effective venue.

According to Gendron, whichever service that TSU decides to purchase will be a free service to students living in TSU residence halls. The technology department plans to finance the service through the university's cable television

contract

"Anyone who is a TSU resident would be able to access the service that would provide tethered downloads," Gendron said. "Tethered downloads allow students to download a particular song to three (or) four PCs. To move the download to an instrument such as an I Pod would cost 99 cents."

Vanderbilt's VUmix costs its students \$16 for nine months to download an unlimited amount of songs to students' computers, but they too must pay the 99 cents to transfer downloads to an MP3 player.

Plans for the service is still in the works, but technology officials as well as members form the Student Government Association are working to provide the best possible service for TSU students.

"I think it wold be beneficial to survey the student body to see if this service is something the students are truly interested in," said Kendrick Boykin, SGA representative-at-large. "Before we purchase a system we need to be certain the students believe that it is worth purchasing."

the 2.36 average of the entire full-time undergraduate student body.

"Athletics is about competition; we want to win in the classroom and on the field," TSU athletic director Teresa Phillips said. "We want our student athletes to lay their best on the line every day."

Forty-one Tiger athletes were placed on the Commissioner's Honor Roll for 2003-04. Seven Tigerbelles were awarded for both Women's Cross-Country and Women's Track and Field, adding 14 medals of honor to players under women's track and field head coach Chandra Cheeseborough last year alone.

"You have to be student first," said TSU's head women's track and field coach Chandra Cheesborough. "Coach Temple used to stress academics first, athletics next and also, extremely importantly, being a young lady. This is very important to me. We have a rich history academically and all we have to do is continue; the table has been set for us all we have to do is sit down and eat. A lot of the girls do not want to be in study hall, so that encourages them to keep track of their course work."

Seven members of the football team, including quarterback Bryson Rosser, who is majoring in elementary education, and wide receiver Kevin

Hollis, who recently graduated summa cum laude with a degree in biology, also earned their way to the Commissioner's Honor Roll.

"This shows that TSU is a school that strives to make sure that athletes are doing well in athletics as well as the classroom," Hollis said. "Being a student athlete is a lot of responsibility and if you can do it, it makes you a better person."

Aeropostale, Inc., a mall-based specialty retailer of casual apparel, gave away \$4,000 total as a part of this award. JSU, Austin Peay and TSU will receive \$1,750, \$1,250, and \$1,000 respectively.

"We're pleased Aeropostale has joined us in recognizing the academic achievements of our student-athletes," said OVC Commissioner Jon A. Steinbrecher. "This conference takes great pride in the success of its student-athletes, not only on the playing field but, more importantly, in the class-room."

TSU won the OVC academic banner for the 2000-01 season after Tigers took the OVC championship in football for two consecutive years in 1998 and 1999 and have been in the top three since then.

"(I)t is difficult to be a student athlete," said former Tiger cheerleader Melinda Dollar, a senior education major from Decatur, Ga. "Athletics can produce a hectic schedule. Practices in the morning and sometimes in the evening, class all day, study hall in the evening for some, and weekend road trips for others; it can overwhelm you if you let it, but as a whole athletes at TSU seem to have found a balance."

Another award, the all-time OVC Scholar-Athlete Award, was awarded to Tigerbelle Mery Udoji during the 2002-03 season. The award is the highest individual honor that can be earned by OVC student-athletes, and is given annually to three men and three women senior student-athletes for their accomplishments in both the classroom and athletic arena, and because of their leadership qualities. Udoji is the only TSU athlete known to have received this honor.

## Tigers will break tie in Memphis

The Tennessee State University Tigers (1-0, 0-0 OVC) will be looking to break the 18-18-2 tie in the all-time series meetings with the Jackson State University Tigers (0-1, 0-0 SWAC) Sept. 18 in the 15th Annual Southern Heritage Classic at the Liberty Bowl in Memphis.

Following last week's Ohio Valley Conference opener at UT-Martin, TSU is scheduled to enter its classic stretch of the season, which usually precedes the OVC games, but does not affect OVC standings

"I told the guys UT-Martin is part of the real (OVC) season," TSU head football coach James Resse said. "This is the season that matters the most."

The first game between TSU and JSU was a 49-13 TSU win in 1949 under Coach Henry Kean. Since the start of the SHC, which dates back to a 23-14 win over JSU in 1990, TSU has a 5-9 record in the annual classic. However, the start of the SHC was not the first time TSU and JSU met on the gridiron at Memphis's Liberty Bowl. In 1984 TSU won 34-14 and in 1987 TSU tied JSU 17-17. The SHC, with an average attendance favorite.

"The SHC brings in a lot of revenue to the city," said Pamela Young, a sophomore from Memphis majoring in allied health. "(W)hen people come to Memphis they usually think of Elvis and Beale Street. We also have a lot of historical sites there. The game is only one part, but it's being able to see new things." .

Last season TSU thrashed JSU 44-14 before a crowd of 52,603. Special teams accounted for two touchdowns and the defense recorded a safety in route to the victory. Ex-Tigers Ahmed Safeullah and Carlos Wright returned a lateral off a blocked punt and scored on a 36 yard run, respectively, accounting for the senior Paul Thomas forced a JSU fumble in the end zone for a safety, leading TSU to a 16-6 halftime lead in a torrential

After the break, senior Charles Anthony scored on runs of 16 and 36 yards and Wright caught a seven-yard pass from sophomore Richard Hartman to end the offensive explosion. Sophomore Jarrett Morrow returned a punt for the final TSU score. JSU won

## Volleyball Tigers expected to be disciplined

Tennessee State University's new head volleyball coach Kathy Roulhac said she expects her players to be disciplined in anything they do, especially on

She said she is looking for chemistry among this season's eight returning players and four freshmen.

"I'm most impressed with junior Catherine Armwood and freshman Kelly Davis," Roulhac said. "Armwood is energetic and...Davis is powerful and strong. Both are very good, aggressive all-around players."

In 2003, Armwood moved to the libero position to lead the Tigers' defensive charge. Armwood led the 2003 Tigers with 402 digs, finishing fourth in the OVC, and also racked up 115 kills and 13 service aces. Freshman Davis of Farrell, Penn., finished her high school career with 1,490 kills, 1,485 assists, 730 digs and 38 service aces. Davis also holds the Farrell High School record for 441 blocks.

Freshmen Allyson Buckner from Humble High School in Humble, Texas, Ashley Douglas of Desoto High School in Desoto, Texas, and Kristen Metz from Estevan Comprehensive High School in Saskatchewan, Canada, are also expected to provide immediate aid to TSU directly out of high school. Buckner, Davis and Douglas were all recruited by former head coach Dawn Reese and Metz was the only player Roulhac recruited.

Returning players and twin sisters LaOuata and LaOuita Marsh said they are anxious to get this season under way.

"I'm looking forward to a great season, especially an (Ohio Valley Conference) championship," sophomore outside hitter LaQuita said.

Roulhac said her long term goal for the Lady Tigers is to win an OVC championship, though the Lady Tigers' team never has made it to the conference tournament.

"This year we have much more experience, communication and chemistry," sophomore outside hitter LaQuata said. "There's great talent this year, so everyone is looking forward to more wins."

Junior Thereza Wright finished last season with a team best 13 blocks and second with 258 kills. Also returning to action in 2004 is senior Janique Suber, who recorded 206 kills and 143 digs, and junior Jennifer Washington, who tallied 247 digs both during the 2002 season after not playing in 2003.

"I feel good about the 2004 season,"

Roulhac said. "The administration made many adjustments to make sure that this season would be better than other season's before."

This spring, TSU fired former coach Dawn Reese. The Tigers finished the 2003 season (7-23, 1-13 OVC) and the 2002 season (13-21, 0-16 OVC).

"With a new coach, I have complete confidence that the TSU volleyball team will have a very good season and represent TSU very well," said Ivory Davis, a sophomore from Atlanta majoring in early childhood education.

The Tennessee State University football team (1-0, 0-0 OVC) won the school's sixth consecutive John Merritt Classic win in a 42-7 pounding of the Southwestern Athletic Conference's Alabama A&M Bulldogs (0-1, 0-0 SWAC) before a crowd of 25,117.

The Tigers' defense recorded four interceptions and allowed only seven points starting the 2004 season off with a

TSU's defense, on their own eight yard line, stopped A&M with an interception by senior defensive end Paul Thomas. The Tigers then went on to draw first blood with a six yard touchdown pass from junior quarterback Bryson Rosser to junior receiver Fred Burnette. The next drive sophomore cornerback Darnell Ray intercepted another Bulldog pass and returned it 43 yards for the Tigers' second score.

In the second quarter, the TSU defense kept the heat on A&M. Thomas pressured the Bulldogs' junior quarterback Johnny Keith into throwing an errand pass to be picked off by sophomore cornerback Aaron Strong. The

Tigers then scored on a Rosser pass to junior receiver Ivan Burley for 14 yards on the way to a 28-7 halftime lead.

TSU kept the momentum in the third quarter as senior safety Justin Williams intercepted the fourth pass of the night that led directly to a 30 yard touchdown run by senior running back Charles Anthony. Senior quarterback Riley Walker finished all scoring with a 20 yard pass to sophomore receiver Jarrett Morrow.

A&M quarterbacks Kelcy Luke and Keith combined for 227 passing yards and no touchdowns on 19 of 35 attempts.

Anthony and Ray earned classic MVP's on offense and defense respectively. Anthony finished the game with a career high 202 yards on 26 attempts and two touchdowns. Ray finished the game with five total tackles, one tackle for a loss, one pass break up and an interception returned for a score.
