Twitter mania makes its campus debut



Twitter, the a social networking in competition with Facebook, is slowly striking students' curiosities and, as a result, gaining popularity on campus.

The Bash Bosh Web site calls Twitter "for sure" the most popular micro-blogging service, great for building blogs or Web site links, in an article titled "Use Twitter for Link Building."

But TSU students locked in on the site have some opinions of their own.

"Twitter is fun and-easy to keep up with friends and family as well as networking,"

said Antonio Benton, a senior mass communication major from Atlanta. "I enjoy keeping up with my friends and Twitter allows you to update whenever, where ever (I am)."

According to A Geek's Guide To Promoting Yourself and Your Online Business in 140 Characters or Less with Twitter by Geekpreneur, tweeting can capture people's interest and

business.

By treating "tweets" as a headline, the ebook said, business relationships form from open-minded people interested in networking.

Nonetheless, many TSU students are becoming accustomed to Twitter and are taking advantage of what it has to offer.

"I was, at first, confused by the site, but now I use it to promote my radio station and get listeners to participate on my show," said Sherman Murdock, a senior communications major from Chicago. "It is an instant gauge of public reactions to major events formulated to only allow people to say something they mean."

Twitter is a micro-blogging

social network allowing users to inform others "What are you doing?" through 140-character updates called "tweets."

The service allows friends, family, and co-workers to communicate and connect without spending a lot of time blogging.

Twitter's popularity caught Facebook's eye when Facebook offered to acquire Twitter for \$500 million of its stock.

When Twitter refused, having believed Facebook did not have \$500 million in stock, the owner of Facebook, Mark Zuckerberg, produced a redesign, which redorbit.com said is an attempt to catch up with Twitter in an article titled, Facebook Makes Changes To

Spring graduates to wear blue academic regalia

This year's spring commencement TSU President Melvin N. Johnson plans to brand commencement by changing the graduation attire and adding an additional award.

This May candidates for commencement will be wearing royal blue caps and robes, with the university seal embroidered on the upper left side of the robe and a zipper with the university seal attached to the zipper.

In lieu of the black robes of the past and all students will be wearing the same blue and silver tassel, regardless of major.

However, students will still be able to wear graduation stoles.

Additional stoles will be worn by academic marshals, TBR representatives

and platform dignitaries.

According to John Cade, director of BANNER operations and protocol, the change in robe and tassel color is way of branding graduation and the institution.

"The goal of branding is to get the students to actually embrace their colors," Cade said. "Students will be pleased to know that the idea of the university as far as branding has come to fruition and it is not a drab ceremony."

Cade says that he has found that students are more concerned with, "Did I apply for graduation?" "Am I graduating?" and "Will I get to wear my academic regalia?".

Some students agree with Cade and Johnson's efforts brand graduation with the school colors.

"I think that it's wonderful," said Brandon Boyd, a senior music education major from Ocala, Fla. "It coincides with our school colors, which are something to be proud of."

However, some students, including Ebony Fresh, a senior political science major from Indianapolis, see the topic of changing the gown colors differently.

"I love school spirit but blue gowns will clash with stole and cord colors and take away from individual's merit," Fresh said.

Another new aspect of this year's spring commencement is the addition of the University's Academic Excellence Award.

According to the graduation Web site, the award was commissioned by Johnson and will be presented to the student who is graduating with the highest honors (summa cum laude) and has the highest grade point average in the graduating class as well.

Caps and gowns will be available in the bookstore beginning April 27th-May 1.

A late processing fee of \$10 will be charged by the bookstore to students who have not picked up their attire by May 4.

Commencement rehearsal is scheduled for Friday, May 8 at 3:30 p.m. for 9:00am graduates and 5:30 for 2 p.m. graduates.

This spring's commencement will take place in the Gentry Center Complex May 9 at 9 a.m. for the College of Business, College of Engineering, Technology and Computer Science, College of Health Sciences, School of Architecure and Consumer Sciences and the School of Nursing

Students in the College of Arts and Sciences, the College of Education, and the Institute of Government will hold its exercises at 2 p.m.

I was completely oblivious to the Twitter "hype" soaring around the media.

I first heard about Twitter through one of my professors mentioning the Web site's popularity; however its circulation was not strong enough on campus to further my attention.

The majority of the student body is on Facebook, which allows a connection with college students' worldwide.

Keep Up With Twitter.

"People go to different social networks for different reasons so why make them the same," said Aaron McGee, junior communications major from Nashville.

The new changes on Facebook, Zuckerberg said in his administrator's blog on Facebook in an entry titled, "Improving your ability to share and connect," are so people have the ability to connect with friends, celebrities, musicians, politicians and organizations and concentrate on updates.

The new redesign, however, has become controversial as more than 1.7 million users signed up for the Petition of Against the New Facebook to stop Facebook from making large changes without asking users.

"Facebook now is so confusing and frustrating when you are trying to find comments and everything has been rearranged," said Albany Carpenter, a sophomore sociology major from Clarkville, Tenn. "Everything looks like what the status updates used to, it's all the same."

Out of 142 students asked only four students were active on the Twitter Web site. Though Twitter has not yet found a huge following on campus, the hype continues to heighten student's curiosity.

"I'm not on Twitter, but I have been curious to what it's all about," said Desiree A. Thomas, a junior mass communication major from Memphis. "I heard it's very addicting where you can post questions and get answers like an instant gratification site."•

Students fret about TSU's image

Three days a week, Caroline Bane drives 43 miles from her Berry Hill home to Middle Tennessee State University in Murfreesboro, Tenn.

Bane, a junior accounting major could travel just ten minutes to find her degree at TSU, but she is looking for more than just a framed degree.

"When I'm not in class my professors know it," Bane said. "Why would I want to go to a school where the staff doesn't seem to take their job seriously? This is my future we're talking about here!"

Bane is not the only middle Tennessee student who chooses to commute to a state school where she feels she is receiving an education superior to one she would receive at TSU.

Leonard A. Wilson, a 2008 graduate with a degree in interdisciplinary studies from Milwaukee came to TSU as a transfer student in 2005.

After a run-in with the financial aid department, Wilson was unsure of whether or not he made the right decision to move to Tennessee.

"(The department) sucks," Wilson said. "I was talking to a financial aid counselor about how I could get in-state tuition and she told me that I needed to sit out a year and work full time, which I later found out was untrue.

"As a counselor, she should never advise a student to sit out an academic year, ever," Wilson continued.

While the requirements for a student to apply for permanent in-state residency as a financially independent student are that he or she "must not have been enrolled in any institution of higher learning for at least 12 months leading up to the residency application deadline, worked full-time for this 12 month period in Tennessee, or filed federal taxes for the state of Tennessee to qualify for permanent change in residency," there exist at least 10 other

categories for which a student may apply for residency.

Recently, TSU suffered a \$3.2 million budget reversion, which left hundreds of students packing their bags to go home because they had been purged.

TSU saw almost a ten percent decrease in enrollment, while MTSU's enrollment reached 23,872 in 2008, nearly a three percent increase from 2007.

"The education I'm getting at MTSU is worth the drive," said Lacey Clemet, a MTSU student who lives in west Nashville.

Last fall a slew of stories on TSU hit the news, leaving an already struggling university to fight for its reputation. It began as early as registration of 2008's fall semester.

Students, who waited hours in line to ensure promised financial aid, were notified by local newspapers and TV stations that their identities were in jeopardy.

Shortly after, TSU hit the front page of the Nashville Scene when columnist, Tracy Moore, described in detail the struggle of students trying to work with student service programs such as Financial Aid, which only highlighted the inefficiency of TSU's administration.

"Admissions and Financial Aid are a student's first impression of a university," Bane said. "If those departments aren't competent, how do I know (that) my professors will be?"

With other reports of budget cuts and TSU's financial struggle weaving through the local media, other Nashvillians believe the institution needs to market its academic strengths in order to shed a positive light

on the university and increase enrollment.

Desmond A. Jackson, a sophomore business administration major from Memphis who attends MTSU, said he is satisfied with the financial aid department there and is comfortable with them handling all of his information.

"The financial aid department at MTSU is pretty good based on other schools I hear about." Jackson said. "I haven't had any major trouble receiving any type of aid or refund check from them. It usually takes about a week once classes start, for me to receive my refund."

TSU has fostered the futures of greats such as Oprah Winfrey, Wilma Rudolph and Levi Watkins.

"I came to TSU on an academic honors scholarship (more than) 20 years ago, and believe that TSU still has high standards for its students," said TSU alumnus, Tobia Burdette.

Although others believe TSU has traditionally been marketed as an Historically Black University (HBCU), its reputation as a state school is growing stronger.

While Murfreesboro native Mike Viars graduated from the University of Tennessee in Knoxville, he believes TSU needs to put to the forefront its academic strengths in the Nashville community.

"TSU under-markets its own value." Viars said. "The university has a lot to offer Tennesseans in general, not just the black population.

"Many HBCUs market their academics well and succeed and there is no reason TSU shouldn't rival MTSU in academics and enrollment," Viars added.

TSU femcee makes professional moves, expands

On a cloudy Tuesday night in a small East Nashville house, Weetu, The Voice of the Streets is waiting.

On the surface, she is waiting on the members of her live 10-piece band, Da Truth, to arrive and begin practice for a show on the following Thursday night.

On another level, she is waiting on the recognition and attention that comes with the type of music and high-energy performances she and her band deliver every time they come to the stage.

This type of waiting is one that can only come from hours, days and years of tireless dedication and drive toward a single goal.

For her, the goal is being a musician, artist and businesswoman; however, Weetu also hopes her motivational and powerful will empower and bless many others.

The past four years have been a very busy time in the life of Sheryl-Lynn Weetu Swen.

In the short but often monumental period of college matriculation, she has made quite a few transitions and continues to evolve.

Like the various forms of life that have survived on this planet, evolution makes sure the best living creatures move forward.

Swen can count herself among those who have enjoyed success.

Evidence of her success is plastered on the walls of the room in her home she has fashioned into a state-of-the-art music studio.

From the floor to the ceiling, there are depictions and posters of Nas, LL Cool J, Talib Kweli and even Janet Jackson.

To her they seem to be representations of what could be if she continues the path she is currently riding on.

From the technology and décor within the space, it is clear that she intends to continue.

Swen has accomplished much as an independent emcee and now even more as an entrepreneur and label head.

While her goal has always been the production and performance of the music that has helped shape her life and solidify her character, the elements that have made her diversify her involvement within the music industry and other closely related areas are yet another form of evolution.

"I've had to sacrifice a lot to get to where I am now," said Swen, a senior commercial music major from Atlanta byway-of New Jersey. "Music is my life. My life revolves around this music. When it comes to sacrifice, I've put everything on the line to make this happen."

But sacrifice is not the

only thing the artist is giving to her upward climb as both an artist and a person. She has also taken it upon herself to begin branding herself and expanding her vision.

She credits the ever changing expansion of her vision is what as the largest part of her continued success.

Originally making her debut as a rapper and performer when she began as a student on TSU's campus (*Meter* issue 4/24/2006) and later evolving into a seasoned performer and opener for TSU's Homecoming Concert (*Meter* issue 10/29/2007), the artist is now working outside the campus that has nurtured her to further

spread her name and continue building her growing brand.

Consequently, building the brand is a segment of her expansion that is drawing lots of attention.

In early 2007, Swen put together what would become 'We All We Got Entertainment,' the leg of her business that includes her own production studio, artist management, a fully staffed street team and even a clothing line.

Each of the aforementioned elements • work together to push the artist forward, toward mainstream attention.

The effects have already begun to catch the attention of students and fans.

"I was talking to a friend about trying to get a hold of a T-shirt," said Melinda Goldthread, a senior mass communication major from Nashville. "I saw some of them at a show at Belmont and since I like the music, I know I can do the clothes too."

Though the brand has stretched to include many different elements besides music, it is still the primary focus.

First and foremost, she feels that she is a lyricist, and because she is a lyricist, her words and the message she has to deliver mean a lot to her.

Singer/producer Ryan Leslie has dropped one of this year's smartest and most entertaining albums, but most music fans don't even know his name—yet.

Leslie's self-titled debut album is an eclectic mix of smooth balladry and enough clever tonguein-cheek flirtation to fill dance floors and blare out of almost everyone's car speakers.

A product of Diddy's Bad Boy camp, Ryan Leslie features much of the trademark crisp production and modern songwriting that is associated with the famous label.

It makes the album seem almost incomplete. even though there is a solid closer on the collection of musical goodies. In fact, the short track list is the one of the album's only weaknesses.

Adding a couple more tracks would have been the much needed oomph to make this debut even more special.

Bottom Line: Had Ryan Leslie given a little more to listeners, we could have a solid innovative classic on our hands instead of a short EP-style glimpse into the mind of an actual artist.

When Swen is making music, be it live or on wax, she aims to spit 'hot fire.' All she has to do is get the fire out to the masses. To her, the fire is the lyrics that she spits and the live music that caries them.

"I'm dedicated to using all of the gifts that God gave me," Swen said. "If it is me being able to snap my fingers and kick my feet, that's what I'm going to do."

She credits much of her success to her relationship with a higher power.

"Before I write anything, I make sure that I pray," Swen said. "I don't know where it comes from after that but that is always the first thing that I do."

In doing so, she believes that the work is more than an opportunity to be seen on stage.

"My music is a reflection of God," Swen said in a serious tone. "He placed this gift in me, so who am I making this music for? It is for Him so that I can be a living testimony for others."

She also points out that her music is for the people despite the spiritual place it comes from.

"People ask me all the time if my music is secular (or not)," Swen said. "I'm just very spiritual and make it known where (the music) comes from."

As she sits her cup down on her very own production console, the front door opens and her drummer and music producer, Jeremy Mitchell, a junior commercial music major at Middle Tennessee State University and a native of Memphis walks in.

The interaction between the two is nothing short of close. They call each other by nicknames and function like

There are jokes shared but also serious exchanges regarding the gig that is set for the coming Thursday.

Mitchell has been working with Weetu since she decided to make her sound jump with live instrumentation.

"We used to be in the band together at TSU," Mitchell said. "We just decided one day to get something together. And we've lasted through about five different bands. I just love to do it."

Mitchell and Weetu are two of the

primary collaborators when it comes to putting together the sounds that end up ultimately being used by the band.

Despite line up changes with the active band, Weetu and Da Truth have been performing in shows all over Nashville and beyond.

The performances serve as opportunities to get exposure and to deliver the message that Swen is striving to make known everywhere.

The message is ultimately positive and serves to inform and encourage listeners. With real lyricism Swen aims to not waste time on negativity but focus on building and uplifting.

Though she wants the exposure and attention for both her and the band, she is not willing to compromise herself or her music to get there.

"It's as if they don't believe women will be heard if they aren't performing naked," Swen said in an earlier interview. "(T)hey wanted me to sell my soul and I wasn't about to do that."

A moment later, Jeremy Jones, Weetu's bassist and a senior music major from Clarksville fills the room with loud untamed energy.

He, like Mitchell, met Swen in TSU's Aristocrat of Bands and has been supporting her dream since he joined her in the live band.

"The time was right when I joined the band," Jones said. "I wasn't even an original member but the band was doing what it needed to do. We all had the drive to make it happen and we (are) trying to do it."

In between interviews with Swen and members of Da Truth the energy is high.

Weetu keeps disappearing into her own booth to freestyle while Jones negotiates rehearsal times by phone and Mitchell scribbles silently in a notebook.

Although they are seemingly operating independently, they are all connected somehow and that connection stems from more than just the band they play in.

They are like family. With all of the members working toward getting good music out into the streets, Weetu believes they are all ready for the next step.

As the sound guy at the Soul Lounge performance on Thursday night makes the last tweak of the stage's sound monitor, Weetu and Da Truth break off into a live rendition of Hello and under the lights on stage they all look a little different than they did only days and moments before.

Now, 'instead of the rehearsal, they are a band making live music and entertaining a listening crowd.

"The sky is definitely the limit," Swen said. "I truly believe that. Look at where Def Jam came from and where it is now. Believe in yourself. If you don't know one else will."

If she continues to truly believe, she may just stand should to shoulder if not higher than those 'greats' she has just mentioned.•

Hilson's 'perfect' debut weathers storms

In A Perfect World... Keri Hilson Grade: A-

Talented songwriter and emerging "it girl" Keri Hilson aims to make a name for her own beautiful voice in her richly entertaining debut, In A Perfect World….

After months of delays and push-backs, the album finally makes it to the purchasing public and delivers with a spirited collection of dancefloor gems and cleverly weaved wordplay.

Ms. Hilson is first and foremost is a songwriter and her wordplay is the dominating force throughout the work.

As a member of the songwriting and music production collective know only as the Clutch, Hilson has penned hit singles for the likes of Ciara, Timbaland and Nicole Scherzinger of the Pussycat Dolls.

She holds tight to the writing skills that have been a major earner for her by blessing her own debut with catchy hooks and introspective lyrics.

Clever wordplay is one of the first things a listener is likely to pick up with this collection of tracks. On the current chart topper, *Turnin Me On*, Hilson delivers a list of do's and don'ts to fellas that have the gall to approach her.

Power is added to the track by the ubiquitous emcee Lil Wayne giving "Ms. Keri" the types of lines she wants to hear from her ideal man. Mixed in with the solid lyricism is the use of interesting song concepts with emotional ties.

On the lead single, *Energy*, Hilson does well with a song dedicated to a lover that is taking more than they are giving. This is also the case on the smooth groove of *Alienated* where she addresses her loneliness after the disappearance of a lover.

The album is backed mainly by production from frequent collaborators Timbaland, his

protégée Danja and Polow Da Don and their sonic soundscapes do nothing but add additional power to the already solid effort. Hilson's sweet vocals and songwriting could have easily dominated the album alone but the beats make it a classic-level debut.

Having cut her teeth in the industry as a writer before making an attempt to take the spotlight for herself, Hilson has made a lot of friends in the music industry and those connections support her through out the LP.

With tracks laced by the aforementioned Timbaland and Polow Da Don and features from R-Kelly, NeYo, Lil Wayne and Kanye West, it is clear that Hilson means business.

As previously mentioned, Hilson does not rely on the beats to make her music great.

It is interesting to hear the subtle differences in inflection and delivery between tracks on the album as well. Hilson shows that a blanket sound is not always the most useful tool in the delivery of vocals. This approach is a winning philosophy on this album.

On some tracks she is breathy and light, others she is full-throated and strong and the results make the album exciting and interesting. There is no chance to bore the listener if each track is treated as a separate entity.


The album's only weakness shows itself with the songs that don't necessarily fit in with the cohesively eclectic sounds. One or two of the tracks just don't fit the dominant sound on the LP.

This is apparent on the Akon assisted moan-fest *Change Me*. While the song isn't horrible, it fails to match the futuristic scoring that carries the album.

Overall, the album is amazing and is almost totally flawless. Hilson is a colossal talent and *In A Perfect World* shows her skills well.

Bottom Line: Keri Hilson is the truth and the album is definitely one that should be placed in everyone's personal collection.

Tigers, new and old, take shot at Pros

March 20 marked the day that 22 former Tiger football players showcased their talent to scouts from the National Football League (NFL).

The day began in the weight room with the players checking in. Immediately following, the players lined up for height and weight measurements along the bleachers of Gentry Complex Center.

Then it was time to let the players began their long-awaited testing.

"It's 32 teams, I only need to be on 1," said James Finch, a former Tiger offensive lineman from Indianapolis.

The nerves inside of Gentry were running wild as the first three attempts at the broad jump drill were labeled as scratches.

According to the scout that was measuring the distance of the jumps, the players only got 2 chances to record the

best jumps possible.

The players realized they had to make the best of their limited opportunities, and Ronald Evans, former wide receiver from Birmingham, recorded a jump of 9 feet 5 inches, good by any standards.

"I was thinking to myself, these guys either did not work out like they should have in order to get themselves ready for this, or they must really be nervous," said Charles Sparkman, a junior TSU offensive lineman from Nashville. "I've seen all of them jump further and have a clean landing."

When the scouts finished recording the numbers for the broad and vertical jump drills, they headed to the weight room to begin the 225-pound bench press testing.

Twenty NFL teams represented to scout the 22 players in attendance, but the main attractions were All-American running back Javarris Williams, from Richmond, Texas, and first team All-Ohio Valley Conference tackle Cornelius Lewis from Jacksonville, Fla.

Williams and Lewis both attended the NFL combine in Indianapolis February 18-24 and posted good numbers on the bench press.

Williams decided to opt out on the bench press and keep his numbers from the combine.

Lewis on the other hand saw this as an opportunity for improvement and went from 29 reps in Indianapolis to 31 reps before a cheering crowd inside the weight room of Gentry Center.

"I believe he has a great work ethic," said John Lopez, a freshman kicker from Brentwood. "I believe it shows the scouts he works hard because to improve your bench press max in that short period time, you have to be working hard."

Next, players were tested in the speed drills. Scouts from the New York Giants, Minnesota Vikings and several other teams stood at the finish line with their stop watches waiting for the coveted 40 yard dash.

"I don't know what I ran," said Tyron Johnson, a former cornerback from Richmond, Calif. "One scout clocked me at a 4.3, another clocked me at 4.4, and another said I ran a 4.55."

Another former Tiger sensation that was taking advantage of the professional attention was quarterback Antonio Heffner of Memphis.

• Heffner was given a 'thumbs up' from one scout after posting a good time in the 3 cone shuttle drill.

The scouts wanted Heffner to participate in quarterback and wide receiver drills because of his versatile skill set.

Heffner met their expectations by posting a solid time of 12.86 seconds in the 60-yard shuttle.

"I just want to prove to the scouts that I can play at the next level," Heffner said.

Despite the unfavorable field conditions, many of the former Tigers were impressive.

"The more positions you can play, the more valuable you are," said Andre Williams, owner of William and State and Sports.•

But did you know that sexual intercourse is the number one cardiovascular exercise?


